"Change?!?!"

Dear Friends of Immanuel,

For a number of years now this lead page has been about songs ... a few years ago we reviewed the lyrics of some Contemporary Christian songs and a few old Gospel songs that really highlighted the Bible's Gospel message; then we took over a year looking at some "lost" hymns (hymns that were in some of our previous hymnals that were not included in the current hymnal even though they had significant lyrics); and for the past couple years we've looked at some of the hymns that are 'new' to us in our new hymnal. But our lead page will change.

Change?!?! But... but... we're Lutherans — we don't like "*change*"!! © *Right?!* We are often resistant to change. We don't like when things that we're comfortable with change. We may even get angry or react badly when things change.

But, my friends, change happens. And maybe it would be good for us to take a moment and ponder what does not change even when changes happen!

So, what do we do when we face the *unknown*, ... the different, ... the scary, or even startling?? What's worse is that sometimes when we are facing such changes people around us may point to and highlight the dark and scary things! ...like walking through the valley of the shadow and those around us are pointing at the dark objects—not as if guiding us but more as scaring us about the darkness. We may wonder if everything up to that point had been a lie ... Should we just give up? Run away? Turn our back on what we're there for?

But, dear child of God, that is precisely when we need to flee to the cross!! ...to the open arms of our gracious God!! When nothing seems to make sense, when the church or church leaders disappoint, or falter, or fail, when it seems that nothing can make it better, ... flee to the cross!! Jesus is still our loving Savior and He has not and will not abandon us. This is not just about Church leaders, this is for ALL of us; for *all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God* and together we have missed the mark of God's expectations; and all of us have failed to remain steadfast on the Lord's

Philippians 4:8 (NIV) instructs us to think about things that are noble, lovely, admirable, excellent and praiseworthy. By extension, turning those positive thoughts into words causes "kindness pebbles" to spread God's light in ripples throughout someone's day — and, doubtless, through ours.

Worry is a conversation you have with yourself about things **you cannot** change. Prayer is a conversation you have with God about things **He can** change.


FROM THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS:

- The January meeting was opened with prayer.
- A motion to accept the minutes for the previous meeting was passed unanimously.
- Reviewed financial reports.
- Old Business: Matching Grant from the Lutheran Legacy Foundation will be applied to the facilities fund. The next Voters' Assembly is Feb. 24 after church service.
- *Guests:* Kim Wright, DLS Principal, gave a report on Danville Lutheran School. Phil Muehl, DLS Board Treasurer, gave a DLS financial report. DLS budget will be presented at the Voters' Meeting on Feb. 24.
- *DLS Principal's Report:* 3rd Quarter Chapel Mission Project is the LCMS Deaf Mission. Enrichment classes after school have begun. *Preschool in Action* Open Houses are scheduled for early February. General public invited to *Experience DLS*. In March, potential new students will be able to shadow at DLS Mar. 11-22 by appointment. Radio commercials planned.
- *Worship Report:* The congregation seemed to approve of the 6:30 Worship time during Advent. Lenten services will have the same time.

GIFT (SCRIP) CARDS: The next Scrip Card order is due to the church office by 1 pm on Feb. 11 and will be available for pickup Feb. 17. How does this help Immanuel? Each vendor gives us a percentage of the face value of the gift card which is our profit. This rate depends on the vendor and ranges anywhere from 1.5 - 14%. We encourage you to give it a try - it's easy! Right now this provides \$700 - \$1,000 of income annually for the church, but it could be much more if more people utilized this opportunity! Order forms are on the information table. Orders are not limited to the vendors listed on the order blank: a full vendor list is on the hall bulletin board. Write the name of the vendor, denomination of the gift card, number of cards wanted, and total amount on a blank line of the order form. Most of the local fast food/chain restaurants, plus Meijer, Wal-Mart, and Big R have cards available every Sunday and in the office during the week.

SAVE THE DATE! Pi (pie) Day is coming up on **Mar. 10** and the Spring Rummage and Bake Sale is scheduled for **Mar. 30**. Clean out those closets – Your unused items can become someone else's treasure!

CAPITAL FUND DRIVE COMMITTEE: The school windows have been installed on the east side of the building—with the exception of the swing out windows and reinstalling the air conditioners! Praise God and thank you for your donations!! We are now starting to plan the phases for replacing the windows on the west side and school foyer. Window history: the windows have deteriorated over the years (about 60!), been repaired, and now need replacing. When it rains, it comes through the glass blocks into some of the classrooms. The tuck-pointing between the glass blocks is almost gone, and the caulking around the windows has become brittle. We discussed just doing the tuckpointing and caulking, and it was estimated to cost around \$16,000 and it would not correct the entire window problem. Arrow Glass from Champaign did the replacement windows at Danville High School, and they gave us an estimate which was over \$110,000 for all the windows. He is willing to work with us and do one window at a time or as many as we want. Each classroom window costs \$10,710; the other windows are smaller and vary in price. New windows will also help lower our heating and air conditioning bills since they are energy efficient. If you or a group of members would like to sponsor a window by raising the money for it, please contact Jo Van Hoveln or Wayne Mann. Prior generations worked and sacrificed to build the school/church building, and it is up to us to preserve and improve our church home just as we would our own household's. There is a cost breakdown for the windows along with drawings of each type of window on the Capital Fund bulletin board; please stop by and check it







AROUND THE CLASSROOM

Danville Lutheran School



Music

In music, we continue to read the notes of the treble clef in all classes. Choir is reading the notes by identifying the solfege syllable and learning to recognize intervals between the notes to make singing easier and more in tune. K-2 are learning to read and identify line notes and space notes, so and mi solfege syllables, and also how to write notes on the line and in the space. Reading music is like learning a whole new language, so between 3rd and 8th grade there is always some aspect of note reading, in xylophone, recorders, beginning band, or junior high band. It is an important skill to have to be able to sight-read note names without having to write them in first, and that is our continued focus.

Mrs. Connie Marxman-Preschool 3/4

We have started our Book Buddy take home reading program. Each child, once a week, chooses a book with a corresponding plush buddy to read to at home. The parents ask the child questions about the book and writes down their child's words. These are shared with the other children in class. These are kept in their portfolios. This is a good way for the children to build on their attention span, build memory recall, vocabulary, and help them to understand beginning, middle and end. During Jesus time, we are looking at the many ways Jesus cared for and showed His love through His miracles. We begin our five week study of our five senses and match up a miracle story with each of the senses.

Mrs. Tabby Hammer-Preschool 3/4

Reading is a favorite time of the day. We read at least 1 book a day that goes along with the weekly theme. We discuss the pictures in the book and sometimes you can catch us acting out the story. During the month of February, we will be focusing on the author, Jan Brett, and her many books. In the month of March, we will have a weekly theme all about the author, Eric Carle.

Mrs. Sue Heidle-PreKindergarten

Reading is such an important part of the pre-k day. We read many stories that go with the theme for the week. When we talked about snow and arctic life we read books on penguins, seals, snowy days and many other snow related books. We did an art project using puffy paint based on Ezra Jack Keats book The Snowy Day. We talk about the author and illustrator. We discuss the characters and setting of the books and enjoy predicting what will happen next. Two of our favorite books are The Wide Mouth Bullfrog pop-up book and There is a Monster in My Book.



SPECIAL READING/LITERATURE EDITION

Mrs. Penny Tibben-Grades 3/4

In literature, the third and fourth graders are 'not on the same page.' After finishing a series of fantasy selections, the fourth graders are locating the main idea of a paragraph, determining the supporting details and practicing summarizing nonfiction paragraphs. Note taking begins in social studies and science. Third graders are identifying the sequential events of realistic fiction and drawing conclusions about the story's ending. Both grades love to read. They also still love being read to, and are learning about pioneer life in the 1800's with a historical fiction, On the Shores of Silver Lake. This love of reading carries over into religion. We read the Bible accounts of God's prophets calling us to repentance and look forward to the Last Day when that cycle of sin/forgiveness will come to an end. Come quickly, Lord Jesus!

Mr. Dan Yagow-Grades 5/6

During this past month and in the month ahead, we have been reading and studying nonfiction accounts based on the theme, "The Changing Planet." Several of our selections have included the Everglades, the vastness of the oceans, and viewing the Earth from space. In February, we will begin a novel titled Number the Stars. In this historical fiction account, we will appreciate the trials and challenges of the Jews during the time of the Holocaust. Later in April, the class will take a field trip to see a play based on this story.

Mrs. Kim Wright -Junior High

February brings two new novels. Grade 7 is reading Walk Two Moons by Sharon Creech. This is a funny, yet poignant, story of a thirteen year old girl traveling across the United States in search of her mom. Her travels take us to several US landmarks and National Parks. We will visit these locations via virtual field trips. Grade 8 has begun The Adventures of Tom Sawyer. The students will learn about the life of Samuel Clemens and focus on characterization and dialect. As always, learning new vocabulary is an important part of our literature classes.

KINDERGARTEN

Mrs. Marah Showers We are continuing to learn the final letters of our alphabet this month. Now that we know most of our letters and sounds, we are perfecting the process of blending them together to read and write words. We work mostly with our letter tiles (each student has a set of tiles containing one letter per tile) to practice spelling words. This gives the students an opportunity to form words on their own, as well. In reading, we are continuing to work on rhyming words, counting syllables, isolating the beginning sounds of words, and determining the final sound in a word.

GRADE 1

Mrs. Sara Fauser

The first graders are starting to read longer books. We are starting to read beginning chapter books like Henry and Mudge and Fly Guy! Our theme for our next Literature Unit is Hello, Neighbor! During this unit we explore how we can show our friends and neighbors that we care. I love teaching this unit at a Lutheran School because we also learn about spreading the Good News that God loves them, too.

GRADE 2

Mrs. Katie Rouse

In our upcoming literature unit, Imagine That, we will read stories that will allow our imaginations to run wild. Students will focus on cause/effect, making inferences, and synonyms/ antonyms. Our stories will cover various genres, including fantasy (The Day Jimmy's Boa Ate the Wash and How I Spent My Summer Vacation), informational text (Dr. Mr. Blueberry and The Emperor's Egg), and realistic fiction (Cool Ali).


