A Message from Pastor Callahan

"Not only that, but we rejoice in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, and hope does not put us to shame, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us."

- Romans 5:3-5

Dear Friends of Immanuel,

Read that passage from St. Paul's letter to the church in Rome again. What in the world was he thinking when he set ink to paper and penned these words? Does Paul really mean that a Christian is supposed to "rejoice" in suffering? Who does that?

Sometimes, I think that this can be one of the hardest passages in Scripture to wrap our minds around, especially in those times when we are in the midst of our suffering. It is in those times, when we are suffering from the perils of sin in this world that I think these words are the hardest pills of all to swallow. Many of you reading these words now are struggling with some kind of suffering; mental, physical, emotional, or spiritual. We are creatures with all of these different dimensions to our person, and they are continually under assault. The devil and his minions whisper lies and half-truths into our ears on a routine basis, urging us to distrust the Word of the Lord written for us as the infallible and inerrant Word that it truly is. Perhaps you are struggling to wrap your mind around a situation in your life, or the life of someone close to you and can find no reason, at all, for the peril that is being faced. Or, perhaps you know the reason all too well, and are working hard to come to terms with the reality of what you know. Perhaps, like so many in our world today, you are struggling with the ravages of old age; moving a little (or a lot) slower, unable to do the things that you were once able to do, and finding yourself getting less and less sleep while dealing with more and more aches and pains.

Who among us finds those times in which to rejoice? I would venture to guess that there are not very many of us who have the ability to find joy in those times very often. A quick perusal of any social media will quickly show that there are, in fact, more people willing to complain about their situation and struggles than to find joy in them. But that is not unexpected, because that is our natural inclination, isn't it? That is also the reason that the Holy Spirit inspired St. Paul to write these words. In the passages preceding and following these, Paul talks extensively about "justification by faith" which, as we know, is a core doctrine of the Lutheran Church. His greater point is this; since we have been justified by Christ, we have peace with God. But that necessarily means that we will not have peace with the world, because the devil and the world cannot stand the God with whom we have peace. So they will never leave off harassing us, as long as we have peace with God.

But Paul's other, larger, point here is this; "Through [Christ] we have also obtained access by faith into this grace in which we stand, and we rejoice in hope of the glory of God." My friends we rejoice in our suffering because it is our suffering that reminds us to whom we belong! We rejoice in our suffering because it is a constant reminder to us as to where our true hope is found. Real, living, hope cannot be found in the things of this world for those things, as Paul says in 2 Corinthians, are transient. We rejoice when we suffer, as Luther said, because in our suffering God has counted us worthy to bear the marks of Christ our Lord. In our suffering, we are reminded of the One who is fully in control of all things in our lives, and when it is to Him that we turn, only then can we find hope in our times of greatest need, deepest suffering, and darkest woe.

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

St. Paul reminds us that our suffering has a purpose. Our Lord allows suffering in this life in order that we might, like a runner training for a marathon, increase our endurance. And the longer we endure, the greater our character becomes, as it is nurtured and developed by the work of the Holy Spirit within us. That character, the one that is continually blessed by the Lord, the one who seeks all things from the hand of Him who creates ad sustains all things, he is the one whose hope will never be confounded.

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ, no matter where you are in your lives of faith, I pray that your struggles might always lead you to a greater hope in Him who gave His life for yours, who calls you in the midst of your suffering to find your hope and rest in Him, and who promises you that your heavy burdens have been taken by Him and borne all the way to the cross. May the God of all peace, hope, comfort, and joy uplift and sustain you today, tomorrow, and always in your lives of faith as you continue to trust in Him who called you out of darkness into His marvelous light!

HONEY SUNDAYS: Each year, we have a fundraiser for the Dakota Boys and Girls Ranch. Dakota Ranch helps troubled teenagers focus on life skills and being productive members of society. The Ranch's first family, Ida and Louis Butt, dedicated their lives to ensure the young boys in their care knew the depth of their love and of Christ's love. Because of that dedication, hundreds of children have healed at Dakota Boys and Girls Ranch.

In 1952, a group of remarkable women at a small country church in rural North Dakota were concerned about the number of boys who were "out on their own." Boys as young as 9 or 10 were in the workforce, particularly as farm labor, because their families did not have the means to support them. Many were "half-orphans," whose fathers had died in WWII, or whose mothers had died in childbirth or of illness. These children were in survival straits, just trying to make it from day to day.

The church women thought childhood could be different. They enlisted their own families and pastors and anyone who would listen to develop an idea they called "host families," what we today would call foster families. They searched out Christian homes across the area who could provide safety, security, and most of all – a childhood – for each young boy.

One such family was the Butt family of Tolley, ND. Ida and Louis were themselves childless, and had a large rambling home on the family's ranch. They offered to host six boys, then eight, then added onto their house and hosted 10. And, Dakota Boys and Girls Ranch was born. In time, the Butt's donated their ranch. It was later sold to purchase land outside of Minot, ND, for the home of the first "campus."

Not long ago, a former neighbor of Ida and Louis gave the Ranch a book of poems written by Ida. In addition to the heart of gold she opened to the young boys in her care, Ida had a gift for verse. She often gave personal poems to friends as birthday or anniversary gifts. Below are two stanzas of one of her untitled works. Her goodness and compassion shine through.

"Teach God's Bible every day
In child language, clearly
For your meals take time to pray
Thanking God sincerely.
Gathered daily round His word
Pray for one another
Then, to practice what you heard
Prompt and help each other.

Love each other in the Lord.
Show each child affection.
Gentleness and praise accord
Though he needs correction
As you see our Father do
With forbearance chasten.
Should some failure harass you.
To God's mercy hasten."

Also Gail Garner received a grant through ILS for \$10.000 towards the school windows. Sue Heidle for the ILS cheeseburger fundraiser \$180, and Pam West and Donna Toms for their Advent soup supper donation of \$214. That brings our funds to \$47,800! When you see these people, please thank them for their efforts. These additional funds mean we can replace more windows on the west side of the building. The windows did not get replaced over Christmas break as we had hoped, and the Properties Chairman is trying to meet with the contractor to get this project on their work list for this year. There is a Capital Fund Drive bulletin board in the hallway between the coat room and the parish mailboxes. There is a list of the windows yet to be replaced. Prior generations worked and sacrificed to build the school/church building, and it is up to us to preserve and improve our church home just as we would our own households. PREKINDERGARTEN CLASSES

The pre-k class has had a fun January with a Winter/Snow theme. We made penguins, snowmen and snowy scenes. Our cardboard blocks are covered with white paper and snowflakes so we can make igloos and our water table had water with floating icebergs and all kinds of arctic animals. Then we had snowballs (ping pong balls) and snowflakes in it. So much fun — and mess. In God's time we talked about the Wise Men and their gifts to Jesus. We talked about Simeon and Anna and now Jesus in the Temple. We are preparing for our Muffins for Moms program. Ag in the Classroom came to visit this week with a lesson on wheat. The students guessed how many kernels of wheat were on their stalk and then rubbed them between their fingers to get them off. Then they used a 100's chart to see how many they actually had. They also got to grind the kernels of wheat into flour.

EARLY ELEMENTARY

What does a book, a bubble, and a glass of water all have in common? They all contain matter! The 2nd and 3rd grade students will be investigating a new Science unit All About Matter. Matter is all around us and can be found in three different states: solid, liquid, and gas. We can use our 5 senses: touch, taste, see, hear, and smell to describe the physical properties of matter. Look all around you, what kinds of matter can you discover using your five senses?

MUSIC NOTES










Friendship Squares

This tasty treat doubles as a game to play with a buddy.




What you need:


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
