"And at the end of eight days, when he was circumcised, he was called Jesus, the name given by the angel before he was conceived in the womb." – Luke 2:21

What's in a name? Names are an important part of our identity. They are some of the first things that we learn either to say or respond to, and how you address someone can be indicative of the level of intimacy you have with that person. So, what's in a name?

While we did not, and traditionally do not, have a service to ring in the new year you may not know that this is the appointed Gospel lesson for New Year's Day. That's it, one single, solitary verse from St. Luke telling us that everything was done according to the Lord's announcement to Mary and Joseph. Now Luke seems to make a big deal about names in the opening chapters of his Gospel; Gabriel tells Mary what her son's name is to be, and Zechariah is left unable to speak until he writes the name of his son on a writing tablet. Given all of this, it would seem that names are important things.

So, why all of this focus on names, in particular the naming of Jesus? Well, I think it is appropriate that this is the appointed Gospel lesson for New Year's Day. Because there is a <u>lot</u> to the name of our Lord. The name Jesus means, literally, "He saves" indicating that this child, born in this most miraculous way, was something special. In this child, the Son of God Himself, we witness the salvific promise of God, now born in human likeness, being fulfilled. This is an important name, because it shows us just how God accomplishes His plan of salvation. For no one else could do what even the <u>name</u> of our Lord implies. No other human could save themselves from their sin, let alone the entire human race. But Jesus does, and in doing so He accomplishes all that we never could.

It is also fitting that this lesson is appointed for the beginning of a new year. While we typically use this time to start working on new habits and making resolutions, this Gospel lesson serves as a reminder for us that there is one thing that will never change. No matter how tumultuous the past year has been, and no matter what the new year may hold for any one of us, Luke's Gospel reminds us that it is <u>God</u> who is the one who controls all things. He is the One whose plan is perfect, who fulfills His promises, and who guards and protects us from all harm and danger. This God, who took on human flesh, came to save His creation. More than that, He came to save <u>you</u> from your sin and the death that comes from it! This is the reason that Paul makes the incredible and beautiful proclamation that "at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord."

No matter what 2021 has in store for us; virus, pandemic, illness, or disease, never forget that the One who guards and protects you is Him who saves you from your sins in His death and resurrection. Your Lord, Jesus Himself, came once to save you from your sins, and now makes Himself known to you in His word and sacraments. So, if you are one of the many Americans who makes New Year's resolutions, I pray that you would resolve this year to spend more time with the Lord's Word, more time in the Lord's house, and more time receiving the myriad blessings that your Lord comes to give you every day. For no matter what the devil, the world, or the sinful flesh may throw at you, your Lord will always be the Jesus who saves you from sin and death and gives you new life in and through His blood. May this promise of your God uplift you, comfort you, and sustain you as you begin a blessed New Year in His everlasting love and with His eternal blessings!

I pray that each of you had a blessed celebration ringing in the new year, and that you will continue to receive the abundance of your Savior's blessings each and every day. If you've not been able to make it to church these past few months, I look forward to being able to see you again and spend Sundays with you soon. If you have been able to make it, I look forward to spending this new year with each and every one of you as we continue to receive our Lord and Savior in our ears and on our lips. Lord's blessings on your 2021!

There is a Capital Fund Drive bulletin board in the hallway between the coat room and the parish mailboxes. Prior generations worked and sacrificed to build the school/church building, and it is up to us to preserve and improve our church home just as we would our own household's. Did You Know?

MMANUEL

- In 1911, the cornerstone was laid and the school was dedicated on the corner of Griffin and Fairchild. Cost: \$12,938.00.
- In 1958, ground was broken for a new Education Center on North Bowman Avenue. At the time, it was about the only building in the area, besides farms.
- The same shovel was used in breaking ground for the Education Center and for the new church. It can be seen in the trophy case in the school lobby.
- The cost for the new school building was a little over \$400,000.00.
- The mortgage for the Education Center was burned in 1969.
- The butcher block table in our present school kitchen came from the old school on Fairchild.
- Our school gym is actually named Berthold Hall. Check out the plaque on the wall.

MEMORIES...

In 1959, Kindergarten was optional and only half day. My parents were undecided as to whether I would go to Kindergarten until Pastor Bartz paid a personal visit to our home to say that I should attend at the new Educational Center on Bowman, and so it was! My Kindergarten class was taught by Zora Drews.

My first grade was taught by Ruth Ranzenberger. We learned Spanish, which I still remember today. Teaching second grade was Frances Drews and third grade was Ruth Wendling (Roderick), who was also our cheerleading coach. Fourth grade was taught by Paul Puckett and 5th and 6th grade by Ted Meyer. He was the model to me in becoming a teacher.

Clarence Goldenstern was my 7th and 8th grade teacher. He was also the principal, so we were sometimes left alone while he did principal duties. His office was attached to the classroom, so he could watch us through the window. There were 36 students in that classroom, in tank top desks. Mr. Goldenstern has a pretty good aim, so if you had the desk top up, talking behind it, a chalkboard eraser just might hit it.

Our 8th grade examination and Confirmation took place on the stage in the gym before the new church was built.

The class of 1951 (5 girls, 4 boys) of Immanuel Lutheran School met in a basement room of the school in the morning for Confirmation instruction. Most classes were taught by Pastor Theodore Krause, assistant pastor to Pastor Berthold who would sometimes teach class. Before our Confirmation on March 18, 1951, we were given an oral examination before the congregation on Luther's Small Catechism. We had to be able to recite the Ten Commandments, the three articles of the Apostle's Creed, the Lord's Prayer with the petitions, and Bible passages to support the questions we were asked. I slept with my Catechism under my pillow the night before hoping my brain would absorb the material while I was sleeping.

ZORA DREWS began working with preschool aged children in 1945 when she worked at a playschool at Garfield Park. In 1947, the playschool was turned into a kindergarten. In 1951, she started a private kindergarten in the basement of her home. Three years later, 'ABC Kindergarten' closed its doors and Mrs.

Drews went to start a kindergarten here at Immanuel Lutheran School. In an article written by the Commercial News about her retirement in 1972, Zora recalled that as a member of Immanuel Lutheran Church, she went to the leadership of Immanuel about the church's need for a kindergarten – *"and I ended up over there, teaching it myself."* She taught approximately 1,060 children in her career. In that same article she is quoted saying:

"I think I've collected love from every one of them. I like teaching children that age, because it's a loving age. I've received gifts of every kind, from expensive presents to an apple with a bite out of it. But mostly, I received the love of those children."

There have been many changes over the years, but some things have remained the same. Immanuel Lutheran Church and School remains committed to providing a Christ-centered learning environment where children are valued, receive a quality early childhood academics, and development that will prepare them for a lifelong commitment to God and family. Many years ago, a scholarship was started in Zora Drews' name in honor of her love and commitment for the children in our community. Funds go directly towards the tuition of families struggling financially, and keeps them in our school where we share the Good News every day.

ANNIVERSARY OUTREACH: As part of our Anniversary Celebration, we are reaching out to the community with quarterly gatherings for not-for-profit help organizations in the area with a goal of 125 items each quarter. There is an orange box in the chapel hallway designated for these donations. For the first quarter (January through March) we are supporting the Feed the Children Backpack Program directed by Rose Gates of Trinity Lutheran. The items they are requesting are 4 packs of individual fruit cups (any kind of fruit), 4 packs of individual pudding cups (all flavors), cans of soup (10.5 oz.) in tomato or chicken noodle, beef ravioli (standard size can), and macaroni and cheese in cups—no box mixes. They feed about 400 children a week, so the need is great. She requested that the donations be restricted to the above items since they can get other food items much cheaper than individuals can.

What you do:

- 1. Remove labels and break crayons into 1-inch pieces.
- 2. Scatter pieces on the baking sheet, about two layers thick.
- Bake for 10 minutes at 350 degrees until melted. Allow to cool 15 minutes.
- 4. When melted crayons are the consistency of playdough, press the cookie cutter through them (while still on pan).
- Cool the pan in freezer for 15 minutes until crayons are hardened.
- 6. Remove from pan and break apart the shapes.
