GOD WITH US

No creed but Christ is a common mantra of many protestant denominations, and it is meant well. It comes from a desire to hold fast to sola scriptura. Yet, this doctrine by itself, good and right though it is, has led many Protestants away from sound teaching and doctrine. For example, the seventh day Adventist hold to Old Testament ceremonial law, insisting that Saturday is the true Sabbath and that we must worship on that day alone. They also cling to the rituals of the dietary laws in the Old Testament, forgetting about the vision of Peter in acts 10 and the council of Jerusalem we had in our readings earlier in his Easter season.

We have creeds because they offer us a succinct and concise summary of Christian belief and are in full accord with Scripture and its teaching. The church has the three ecumenical creeds. Namely, these are the Apostle's Creed, the Nicene Creed, and the Athanasian Creed. Tradition, legend, and lore tell us that the 12 Apostles collaborated together to compose the Apostles creed. Each of the 12 apostles wrote a line of this, the shortest, simplest and most ancient of the three creeds. In the fourth century a dispute arose over the nature and identity of Jesus. A man named Arius was teaching that Jesus was the first and greatest of God's creation, but a creature, and therefore, not God. This obviously created quite a commotion in the church. Emperor Constantine, who had recently legalized Christianity by issuing the Edict of Milan in 313AD called the council of Nicaea in 325AD to resolve this dispute about the nature of Christ. This is why the Nicene Creed contains a much longer confession about who Christ is, where He comes from, and the work that He

has accomplished for us men and for our salvation. The creed we confess today also contains some additional statements, especially in the third article regarding the Holy Spirit and His work. These statement were added by the first council of Constantinople in 381AD which dealt with the Holy Spirit, His work, and His identity.

The third Ecumenical Creed is one that we use once a year in our services and is named after and attributed to Athanasius, bishop of Alexandria and a great leader of the Council of Nicaea. In the 18th century, his authorship began to be questioned. Still, it bears his name and the creed is authoritative in the church. This is not because of authorship, but because of the content of the creed. The Athanasian Creed is lengthy because it seeks o clearly lay out the complete doctrine of the trinity and of the Christian faith. Perhaps its most controversial words are those near its end:

And they that have done good shall go into life everlasting, and they that have done evil into everlasting fire. This is the Catholic Faith.

The confusion comes from misunderstanding what a good work is. Here it speaks not of our actions and deeds, but rather to our faith, for in the eyes of God, only a Christian can do or be good. For the work of any person is tainted by sin until it is washed in the blood of the lamb and made white as snow.


The History of the Ecumenical Creeds is deeply fascinating. Each one contains the teaching of the Christian church, and each one was written in a certain time and place, but has a meaning for the church in all time and in all places. The creeds, like the Lutheran Confessions, act as curbs on our path of faith. The creeds keep us focused and can be used as a measuring stick to judge teaching our other theological ideas. The

Three Ecumenical creeds are indeed a great gift to the church.



THE CHURCH HIVE: Bees live in a cooperative way described as “eusociality,” or good relations. Each



bee contributes a specific skill to the colony, synchronizing its efforts for the benefit of all. Likewise, a church's health depends on all members fulfilling their responsibility to the organism as a whole. Descriptions of hive life mirror Paul's words about the body of Christ, with members having different gifts “*but the same Spirit*” (1 Corinthians 12:4). According to R.S. Beal Jr., who was both a pastor and a zoology professor, a beehive is the perfect “*living illustration of how to walk in unity.*” He wrote, “*Those of us who have believed in Jesus belong to one another just as much as we belong to Christ. We cannot live independently of one another anymore than we can live independently of Christ. Like the bees, we must learn to practice the sacrifice, labor, sharing, and submission of love that together we ‘may grow up into him in all things, which is the head, even Christ’*” (Ephesians 4:15, KJV). How are you using your own spiritual gifts to build up your church “hive”?

SUMMER BIBLE CLASS: This summer Bible class will continue on Sunday mornings. We will go through a few short topical Bible studies, looking at Christian ethics in June and miracles in July. We invite you to come and explore these topics throughout the summer!

PASTOR YONKERS VACATION: Katie and I will be out of town **July 2-11**, headed to Pioneer on the Lake in Angola, NY for its first week of camp. The beautiful property has been rehabilitated by friends of pioneer and reopening this summer with its family camp program. CAPITAL FUND DRIVE: We are now working on parsonage updates and replacing the driveway lights. The current bank balance is \$18,418. We made a partial payment of \$11,298 to RC Electric for the lights. There were several fundraisers in the past months which helped build up our finances: rummage sale, soup supper, and pie day totaling almost \$4,100. We will be meeting soon to start planning for our next event fundraiser coming up in late September or early October. The congregation established the Capital Fund Drive in 2012, and thanks to our generous congregation, we have accomplished many needed upgrades/renovations. Prior generations worked and sacrificed to build the school/church building, and it is up to us to preserve and improve our church home just as we would our own household's. BOARD OF DIRECTORS SUMMARY:

The May Board of Directors meeting opened with a prayer by Pastor Yonkers. Important upcoming dates were reviewed.

ILS Director's Report: Mike Heidle stated that we are now at 38 children registered for school next year – well on our way to our goal of 50. He shared some examples of Art to Remember and keepsake books for parents.

New Business:

- ILS Employee Handbook – the handbook has been an ongoing project for the school board and an initial draft was reviewed. There are still a few items that we need to look into and to the District office for guidance on policies. It should be ready for use in the fall.
- June Voter's Meeting – The date has been set for June 12. Items on the agenda will include the budget, an open floor session to address congregational concerns and/or comments, and elections. The positions up for election are President, Head Elder, Properties, Evangelism, Parish Education, Worship, and 4 members of the Christian Education Board. The budget as prepared was approved by the board to present to the congregation.

Christian Education: Sue DeMoss reported that the handbook has been their focus. She enjoyed the kids singing in church and what a wonderful job they did at the PreK graduation as well.

Finance: We have received the \$100,000 bequest from the Penny Faber bequest. 25% of unstipulated bequests are designated to the organ fund. The board voted to put \$50,000 in savings, and send \$25,000 to the building and grounds Lutheran Legacy Fund, which will see a 20% match for an additional \$5,000. Monthly reports were reviewed.

Properties:

- Driveway lights have been removed and the concrete work is expected to begin next week depending on the weather.
- Discussed having a cemetery cleanup, however, the mowing company responded that they will have it mowed and trimmed prior to Memorial Day.
- Power surges need to be investigated. RC Electric will take a look and we will report the surges to Ameren as well.

Evangelism: Looking for new members.

Missions and Social Ministries: Reports were reviewed from the food pantry and Immanuel Cares.

Elders: A motion was passed to transfer the membership of Sarah Albers to Trinity in Harvel. Discussed chapter one of Connected to Christ: Why Membership matters and went over study guide questions. It did inspire great conversation. All will read and complete chapter two for next meeting.

Pastor's Report: Discussed SB818, Confirmation, recognizing visitors to our church, summer Bible study, CID Convention, and his vacation time in July.

Vice-President's Report: Butch met with Kim and Sam to work on the budget for the church and school.





RUNNING the RACE

SUMMER Reading Plan

Life – and exercise – move at different paces for different people.

Some enjoy leisurely walks, strolls or rolls, while others speed-walk, jog or even sprint. Some people have a 26.2 sticker on their vehicle, indicating they've run a marathon, while others boast of running a half-marathon (13.1) or no marathon (0.0)!

Thankfully, you don't have to be an athlete of any kind to run the Christian "race." The Bible uses running metaphors, however, to encourage followers of Jesus to train, focus, persevere and attain the heavenly prize. Use this Summer Reading Plan to strengthen your faith and your relationship with Jesus. Complete one square each day or every other day, and you'll journey through significant chunks of the New Testament this summer. Feel free to invite a friend or family member to join you as a "running partner"!

Mile 1 Read Philippians 1

Re-read verse 6 and consider how your faith journey is a work in progress.

Mile 3 Read Philippians 3

Look back at verses 13 and 14, and brainstorm a list of ways to keep your eyes on the heavenly "prize."

Mile 5 Read Colossians 1

Re-read verse 11. Name three specific ways God gives you strength and endurance.

Mile 7 Read Colossians 3

Look back at verses 23 and 24. What keeps you running for God, not for other people or for personal accolades?

Mile 9 Read 1 Timothy 1

Doodle about how God's law keeps you from wandering away from him.

Mile 11 Read 1 Timothy 3

What aspects of staying "above reproach" are most challenging for you as a follower of Jesus?

Mile 13 Read 1 Timothy 5

Anonymously perform a kind deed for someone in your family or community.

Mile 15 Read 2 Timothy 1

Describe specific ways your life reveals a spirit of power, a spirit of love and a spirit of self-discipline.

Mile 17 Read 2 Timothy 3

Add a daily Bible-reading time to your spiritual training regimen.

Mile 19 Read James 1

Look back at verse 12. Reflect on how God has kept his promises to you. How does that help you during times of trial?

Mile 21 Read James 3

Re-read verses 17 and 18. Pray for godly wisdom as you continue your faith journey.

Mile 23 Read James 5

After re-reading verse 19, think of ways to reach out to people who have wandered away from God.

Mile 25 Read John 20:1-18

Consider how the good news of Jesus' resurrection gives you reasons to run and share the Gospel message.

Mile 2 Read Philippians 2

Re-read verse 5 and pray to have the same attitude as Jesus.

Mile 4 Read Philippians 4

Write verse 13 on a sticky note and place it where you'll see it daily.

Mile 6 Read Colossians 2

Review verses 6 and 7, make a gratitude list and say a prayer of thanks to God.

Mile 8 Read Colossians 4

Write a note or letter to someone who needs spiritual encouragement.

Mile 10 Read 1 Timothy 2

Re-read verses 5 and 6. Offer praise to Jesus for being our mediator and ransom — and for running the race perfectly for us.

Mile 12 Read 1 Timothy 4

As you exercise, ponder verse 8 and brainstorm ways to build your spiritual muscles.

Mile 14 Read 1 Timothy 6

Review verses 11 and 12. In what ways might faith be viewed as a fight? To whom have you made bold profession of your faith?

Mile 16 Read 2 Timothy 2

Re-read verse 5. The next time you participate in or watch a sporting event, compare the value of God's "victor's crown" to earthly achievements.

Mile 18 Read 2 Timothy 4

Memorize verse 7. Think about people you know who have already "finished the race." How can their example strengthen you?

Mile 20 Read James 2

Put your faith into action today by meeting someone's needs.

Mile 22 Read James 4

Review verse 8. Confess your sins to God and ask him to come near you.

Mile 24 Read Luke 15:11-32

When have you run away from God? What brought you back? When have you seen proof of God running toward you (see verse 20, as well as James 4:8)?

Mile 26 Read 1 John 1

Re-read verse 7. Write "Walk in the Light" on a sticky note, and place it by a lamp or light switch.

Mile 26.2 Read Revelation 2:10 Praise God aloud: "Come, Lord Jesus!"


