May will be a busy month here at Immanuel. Our liturgical life is full of festivals, and our life together in this world is full of remembrances and celebrations as well.

We have three major church festivals, beginning with the Ascension of our Lord on May 9th. This is a celebration that Jesus is risen and ascended into heaven, where He prepares a place for us, and a remembrance that He will come back again to judge the living and the dead, and to bring us to be with Him eternally in His kingdom. Following May 19th, we have Pentecost Sunday. Pentecost is the birthday of the church. It was at Pentecost that the promised Holy Spirit came like a rushing wind and tongues of fire. It was on Pentecost that the Gospel began to be preached to all nations as the disciples were enabled to speak in tongues and through the hearing of the Word. Three thousand were baptized that day and the church went out from Jerusalem into all the world.

On May 26th, we will celebrate Trinity Sunday, a day and service set aside for remembrance that we worship the Trinity in unity and the unity in Trinity. This is the day we bring out the Athanasian Creed, the third creed of our church, and remember each of the three persons of the Trinity in the one single Godhead. We are not done yet though. We also will celebrate several holidays that are secular, but which are good and right to acknowledge. Firstly, we have Memorial Day. A day that was officially established in 1971 in the spirit of Decoration Day dating back to shortly after the Civil War. Memorial Day is a day set aside for us as a nation to remember those who have given their lives for our country. Hymns, songs, and prayers will be used on June 2nd to remember those who fought and died for our country. We will remember our military heroes who, through their military service, faithfully served God in the left hand kingdom so that we may, in the words of the collect for Peace, live in peace and quietness.

Lastly, we need to also recognize our graduates as they begin their next steps in their lives. Those finishing high school or college, trade, or graduate school will be recognized on June 9th. God has made our minds and bodies, and He gives us our "reason and all our senses". It is good and right to recognize those finishing important steps in their life-long learning.

Come and worship with us each week and rejoice in God's glory and the great works He continues to do among us in our life together!



STEWARDSHIP SPOT: Whose Is It Anyway? If you have ever bought or sold a house, you are acquainted with the concept of a "title search." Before you can sell your house, and before anyone else will feel comfortable putting down the money to buy it, you have to prove that you really own it. So a title company looks through the public records to ensure that you bought it from the person who really owned it, who bought it from the person who really owned it before that, all the way back to the earliest records of your state, including when your state was only a territory or colony of England. Peak into a preschool classroom during playtime and you'll see a simplified version of this. A child starts playing with a ball, but another child says, "That's mine: I had it first." You can't understand the 7th Commandment without understanding this concept of ownership or title. As the Small Catechism puts it: You shall not steal. What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not take our neighbor's money or possessions, or get them in any dishonest way, but help him to improve and protect his possessions and income. Your neighbor's possessions are his: you don't have a right to take them. And likewise, your possessions are yours. Ownership and property rights are foundational to any functioning society. But there is something deeper to know about ownership, and that is the question of who has the title and ownership to you? Paul says, "Or do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, whom you have from God? You are not your own, for you were bought with a price" (1 Cor. 6:19–20). If you yourself are owned by God, then of course everything that you own, you really only possess by God's love: all of it belongs to Him since you belong to Him. For you were bought with the blood of Christ. This notion is the foundation of all Christian stewardship. It all belongs to God. It should all be used for things that bring honor to His name, blessings to our neighbors and the extension of His kingdom. -

CAPITAL FUND DRIVE FUNDRAISERS: This rummage sale made \$3,190; thank you to all who helped at this fundraiser. The February Super Bowl Sub made \$323; thanks to all who ordered these delicious sub sandwiches. Our next fundraiser will be this fall.

NEW PROJECT: Sentry Roofing put a school roof on the school wing in 1996 which is just about shot. Water is pooling everywhere on the roof. At the most, we can get about 2 more years out of the present roof; it has Dura-Last membrane on it now. The gym roof of approximately 7,200 square feet is in better shape than the school roof. The gym roof has 2 layers while the rest has 1 layer. The Sentry quote to reroof gym is \$72,240 which will put thicker layer on it. Reroofing the lower school roof would be \$167,000. If we do both at the same time, the total cost would be discounted \$7,000. There is an option for another layer of insulation. The skylights would also need to be redone. The Capital Fund Committee is making this our next project with help from the Board of Directors and/or church auxiliary organizations. The fundraising would probably take a couple of years to get the dollars needed. More information on this project will be given out in the future.

GIFT (SCRIP) CARDS ORDERS: The next scrip order is due to the church office by 9 am, May 13. Updated order blanks are on the table in the chapel hallway; please use these for your orders and throw away old order blanks. Orders are not limited to the vendors listed only on the order blank; there is a complete list at raiseright.com/resources/organization, or see the full list posted in the hallway bulletin board. If your vendor is available write the name of the vendor, denomination of the gift card, number of cards wanted, and total amount on a blank line of the order form. The following have been added to the vendor list: McDonald's with a 2% profit to the church, Casey's Gas with a 3% profit to the church, Saltgrass Steakhouse with a 9% profit to the church, Jimmie John's Subs with an 8% profit to the church, and Sonic (when it opens) with an 8% profit to the church. Orders will be ready to pick up after church on May 19.

SCRIP CARD EXPLANATION: The cards come in various amounts and can be used just like a credit/debit card at the designated vendor. For example, you order and get a \$100 Meijer card. The church gets \$3 (3%) of income from this card, and you buy \$100 worth of groceries, prescriptions, gas, etc. with it. There are varying rates on these cards from 1.5% to 13% so the amount the church receives depends on the rate on the individual vendor card. There is a printed list of the vendors and the percentages they give on the bulletin board and on their website at www.raiseright.com/resources/organization. These cards are good anywhere in the USA and make great birthday, *Christmas, new baby, or wedding gifts.*



These athletes had been training for years, and many were setting personal best times and even state records. Most spectators would provide little competition for the runners. But the child was comparing how he'd felt while running at the park, sprinting to a soccer game. Along the track, dozens of teammates and coaches cheered. Each time an athlete passed, she heard strong, pointed encouragement. "You've got this!" "Someone's approaching; time to pick up the pace!" The coaches and runners knew what was helpful and understood how hard the athletes were working. My point: Consider who you allow to speak truth into your life. Do you listen to loved ones who "train" alongside you? Or do you give sideline critics too much space in your thoughts? Heed Proverbs 2:2, which advises, "Tune your ears to wisdom, and concentrate on understanding."

Immanuel invited you to attend Bible class and ask all those spiritual questions that have been on your mind, this is the place, this is the time to ask how many angels can Dance on the head of a pin. We hoped to see you 9:30am on Sunday for Bible class this month.



a fun Flower Frog

What you need:

• Air-dry clay


- Roller
- Vase (or jar)
- Plastic knife
- Straw
- Acrylic paint and brushes



What you do:

- 1. Roll out a portion of clay to about ½-inch thickness.
- 2. Cut out a circle that's slightly larger than the vase opening. (This will allow the finished frog to sit securely on top.)
- To make holes for stems, use a straw to punch out circle shapes. If you make more than one frog, try arranging the holes in different patterns.
- 4. Let dry completely. Then personalize your work with acrylic paint.
- 5. When dry, place the frog atop the vase. Arrange flowers and greenery to make a Mother's Day bouquet.




