"If Christ Had Not Been Raised from Death"

Alleluia! Christ is risen! ... [your part!]


Really?! Are we still doing that?! Well... yeah! It's still Easter – the Easter Season (which continues for seven weeks after Easter Day!). And even beyond that, every Sunday is a little (celebration of) Easter!!

So... Alleluia! Christ is risen! ... [your part!]

Let's look at yet another of the NEW Easter hymns in our hymnal: #486 "If Christ Had Not Been Raised from Death." Please read through the hymn below

This hymn comes right from the great Resurrection chapter of the Bible: Corinthians 15:12–26, where Paul presents the logical implications of Jesus' resurrection. A number of times in that chapter Paul expresses what would be the implication if Christ had not risen: then Paul starkly reverses the conversation with a bold interjection ("but Christ..."). pastor preached on this text an Easter sermon titled "The biggest 'But' in the Bible!" That may seem crass; but it shows the stark contrast Paul incorporated in this text! And that stark contrast is also manifest musically in this hymn!! Note how the first two lines of the hymn have a dark (minor) sound and how the music brightens and even "lifts" at the third line (and note the words for each stanza on that third line: "But now...")!!

Isn't it amazing when the melody itself also conveys the theology of the hymn?!



Before we reflect on the stanzas individually, one last thought: don't miss how each stanza concludes with real life application of our resurrection faith by noting what our life can be (and "is") "in Christ..."!

Stanza one begins with pretty much a direct quotation from I Cor. 15: "If Christ had not been raised from death Our faith would be in vain, Our preaching but a waste of breath, Our

sin and guilt remain." Makes sense — depressing thought, but true: if Jesus was just another dead man, then our faith is nothing!! BUT... Christ did rise: "But now the Lord is ris'n indeed..." This is huge and glorious good news: "His Gospel meets a world of need—" The Lord and Creator of all things died on the cross and rose again for us! Why? "In Christ we are forgiv'n." This marks the difference between eternity in hell and eternity in heaven! Jesus fulfilled God's plan of salvation for us so we would be forgiven and enjoy eternal life restored and reconciled with God!

The first two lines of stanza two are even more stark and dark: "if Christ still lay within the tomb..." then death and decay is all there is for us and we are all alone — the opposite of 'Immanuel' ("God with us")! And the lift: "But now the Savior is raised up, So when a Christian dies We mourn, yet look to God in hope— In Christ the saints arise!" THIS is what makes all the difference at a Christian funeral! We know that is not the end; the grave (sad for now) is the gate to eternal life for us!

Stanza three begins with the folly and usefulness of the Church if Christ was not truly raised. BUT...He truly, truly was! This Word is what makes the Church the tool for God's reviving, restorative ministry to connect us to our Redeemer, our Savior, our truly risen Lord!



CAPITAL FUND DRIVE COMMITTEE:

Our current project is the replacement of the school windows. Praise God and thank you for your donations!! We currently have enough to do the windows of three (almost 4) of the classrooms on the east side. We would like to be able to replace ALL the windows on the East side this summer. That way the entire side would match and present an updated look to the public driving on Bowman. Arrow Glass (the contractor) has them on the schedule to be done this summer. The rest of the windows will be replaced as the funds are available. If we have the funds to replace more windows on the East side, the contractor said they can replace them over the summer as well. Right now we have unfunded on the East side: 1 classroom, 2 windows in the library, 1 in the science room, 1 in the principal's office, and 1 in the copy room. There is a thermometer set up in the Narthex with special donation envelopes. You can return the envelopes in the offering plate or the church office. So far, we have received 75% of our \$55,370 goal to pay for the entire East side windows. There is a cost breakdown for the windows on the Capital Fund bulletin board; please stop by and check it out. Our new windows would look like the windows at the high school; except they could not have the black glass and we would have some that open along the bottom for ventilation and emergency egress. The new windows will help lower our heating and air conditioning bills since they are energy efficient. If you or a group of members would like to sponsor a window by raising the money for it, please contact Jo Van Hoveln or Wayne Mann. Remember, it doesn't matter whether you are pro-school or anti-school, this building needs to be maintained! Prior generations worked and sacrificed to build the school/church building, and it is up to us to preserve and improve our church home just as we would our own household's. It's not too late to pledge or make a donation to the Capital Fund Drive. All donations from small to large are equally appreciated. Our next meeting is **June 14** at 6 pm. All members are welcome to join us!

6th ANNUAL COMMUNITY HOG ROAST

COMMITTEE SPOTLIGHT: Finance is in the spotlight! You are a caring and generous congregation, and we are so very grateful and thank you for that!! Still, it can be difficult keep up with our bills. According to our budget, we need to collect \$10,580.56 in offerings each week. Since beginning of this fiscal year (August 2017), we have reached that amount on less than dozen Sundays. One solution that benefits you as much as it does the church is electronic funds transfers (EFT) using Simply Giving, a program sponsored by Thrivent Financial.

The benefits to you are that it is safe; checks can be lost, stolen, or destroyed in the mail. It is convenient; there is no need to remember to send a check if you go on vacation, are snowbirds, or if you can't make it to church because of bad weather or illness. There is no fee charged to you, and you do not have to be a Thrivent member to take advantage of the program.

The main benefit to the church is the consistent, predictable income. There would be less fluctuation in giving patterns; we wouldn't take such a big hit on Sundays with bad weather, the summer slump due to vacations, etc.

IT IS EASY! There is a *very* easy to fill out form on the table in the hallway with instructions. You can choose the amount you want to give, how often you want to give it, and the date you want it transferred. There is no minimum amount, and you can cancel it at any time. We also have giving cards available to you. You can use this card in your envelope and place it in the offering plate, just as you would if it was your check.

You may already use EFT for your mortgage, car payment, or insurance premium. Now, your gift to God can be regular, and *off-the-top*, just like these other commitments! Please call Kim in the church office with any questions at 442-5675 – I am happy to help!




