# "We Are Called to Stand Together"

Dear Friends of Immanuel, In October the Church's worship continues to focus on Christ's words of teaching, calling

us to greater faith, even as we

anticipate the celebration of



Reformation Day on October 31, with the challenge to continue the reformation in our time! One of the newer hymns in our hymnal, "*We Are Called to Stand together*" {<u>LSB</u> 828} fits that challenge and more.

Although the tune is not as new (the tune, *Ascended Triumph*, was used in our previous hymnal as well as the current hymnal for the Ascension hymn "*Up through Endless Ranks of Angels*"); it is a unique and moving melody that compels this hymn forward as an anthem for faith and missions!

Let's contemplate this new hymn verse by verse:

We are called to stand together With the saints of ages past, With the patriarchs and prophets In the faith they once held fast; Promises and hopes they treasured Now we find fulfilled at last!

In our post-modern era we have an unfortunate tendency to think of our Church unity only as far as our eyes can see; but, ah, dear friends, think bigger! The Church is the total gathering of all believers across all time! The call for us to stand in faith is a call to stand together with those who have gone before—even long before!! We join with the Patriarchs and Prophets of the Old Testament in believing the gracious promises God has made—especially His promise to send the Messiah, the anointed Savior ... just as God promised to the Patriarchs and Prophets.

> 2 Those whom Jesus called apostles Journeyed with Him side by side, Heard His teaching, felt His power, Saw the way He lived and died; Then the news of resurrection They delivered far and wide.

What had been promised in advance, the Messiah, came in the flesh in the person of Jesus. The apostles were eyewitnesses of His miracles, signs, and teachings. But not just as observers; no; Jesus called them "apostles" for He sent them forth to continue to do the same miracles and signs and to proclaim the same message, as

> Millions who confess our Savior Honor Him as Lord and King And, for courage, grace and guidance Ev'ry day their prayers they bring.



CAPITAL FUND DRIVE COMMITTEE:

Our current project is the replacement of the school windows. Praise God and thank you for your donations!! All the windows on the east side of the building are scheduled to be replaced during Christmas break; since Arrow Glass has put us off so many times, they are including the tinted windows - at no extra cost! There is a cost breakdown for the windows along with drawings of each type of window on the Capital Fund bulletin board (between the mailboxes and the coat room); please stop by and check it out. Our new windows will look like the windows at Danville High School and Edison Grade School, and we will have some that open along the bottom for ventilation and emergency egress. The new windows will also help lower our heating and air conditioning bills since they are energy efficient. Our next goal is to fund the windows on the west side of the building. If you or a group of members would like to sponsor a window by raising the money for it, please contact Jo Van Hoveln or Wayne Mann. Remember, it doesn't matter whether you are pro-school or anti-school, this building needs to be maintained! Prior generations worked and sacrificed to build the school/church building, and it is up to us to preserve and improve our church home just as we would our own household's. The parsonage driveway has been repayed; it was in such bad shape that it had to be totally redone. Our Phase 2 pledge drive (a two-year program) started in June 2017, and it's not too late to pledge/donate to the Capital Fund Drive. All donations from small to large are equally appreciated. **GIFT (SCRIP) CARDS:** The next scrip order is due to the church office by 1:30 pm on Oct. 8 and ready for pick up on **Oct. 14** or in the church office after that. Scrip is an auxiliary way to raise money for the everyday expenses of our church home. Each vendor gives us a percentage of the face value of the card which is our profit; it can vary anywhere from 1.5% to 14%. Right now this provides an extra \$700 to \$1,000 income a year for the church, and it could be much more if more people utilized this opportunity to help themselves and our church. These cards are so much simpler than carrying cash (there's no fumbling trying to put change back in your wallet, and they are good anywhere in the USA. Orders are not limited to the vendors listed on the order blank; if you want to order a vendor not listed, first see if it is available through this program by looking it up at: www.shopwithscrip.com. At the bottom of the page is a heading "Quick Links." Under it is "Retailers List." If your vendor is available write the name of the vendor, denomination of the gift card, number of cards wanted, and total amount on a blank line of the order form. There is also a vendor list on the bulletin board in the chapel hallway. Most of the local fast food/chain restaurants (with varying rates of profit to the church), plus Meijer (3% profit of face value of the card to church), Wal-Mart (2.5% profit of face value of the card to church), and Big R (3% profit of face value of the card to church) have cards available every Sunday in the chapel hallway and in the church office during the week.



So far, JAM, Jr. High Choir, and K-2 have performed in chapel or church. 3-6 are learning vocabulary, singing in parts, writing music on the staff, pitch reading, & reading solfege. 7/8 are studying styles of music. # SPECIAL **MATH/STEM & STEAM EDITION**

#### Mrs. Penny Tibben-Grades 3/4

Grades 3/4 find math concepts improving just by being together in the same room! When third graders are introduced to a new math concept, fourth graders get an impromptu review. During a fourth grade math concept, fourth graders get an impromptu review. During a fourth grade math lesson, third graders cannot help but steal a peek at the board. Timed math tests continue to motivate memorization of math facts. Good old flashcards as well as an online version are used to attain the goal of thirty problems completed in one minute— thus the name Mad Minutes. DreamBox Learning is a favorite in both classes. They enjoy being challenged and are thrilled to conquer new math lessons on their former achieves and are thrilled to conquer new math lessons on their Chromebooks. Problem-solving and measurement are being put to use in a hands-on challenge in Makerspace. Each student has been constructing their own Noah's Ark out of a variety of materials. Although it has baffled them at times, they have truly worked hard and are looking forward to putting them on display soon.

#### Mr. Dan Yagow-Grades 5/6

The math emphasis in the fifth grade has been multiplication and division of whole numbers. It is very clear that the memorization of basic facts serves a big advantage when tackling exercises and challenges requiring multiple steps of multiplication. Currently we are drilling the facts with two minute drills in hopes that it will speed up the process in all math operations. The sixth grade is studying data and graphs, frequency tables, line plots, and mean, median, and mode. We have pulled out the calculators in this chapter. Both grades are continuing at their own individual pace with DreamBox.

#### Mrs. Cathy Huff-Junior High

Seventh grade pre-algebra students are adding, subtracting, multiplying and dividing positive and negative integers. We are exploring the distributive property as we learn to break large numbers apart for simple multiplication in our head. Dreambox Learning reinforces the mental math concept as students work through games and activities online. Eighth grade algebra students have explored matrices and scalar multiplication on IXL, an interactive math practice site that increases level of difficulty within an assigned topic. Fridays this year are STEAM exploration days. We have already tried our hand at creating a lunch box that will keep a popsicle frozen for a period of one hour. We will use what we learned from that experiment to create a dog house that will keep a dog warm in cold temperatures. Both groups have started code.org and are busy learning to write computer code. Although we are in the early stages, we will eventually use what we learn to manipulate lego robots later in the year.

Mrs. Kim Wright -Junior High Grades 7/8 have a dedicated STEAM class every Friday. So far, we have looked at the engineering process and how it differs from the scientific process. This set us up for a hands-on activity to build "A Better Lunchbox" or one that would be insulated well enough to keep a popsicle from melting. Students have used critical thinking and math skills to solve puzzles and open Breakout Boxes-the classroom equivalent of an escape room. We are working in Code.org. This teaches us programming skills. Students are highly anticipating the use of the new 3D printers. These devices are an exciting addition to our curriculum. We cannot wait to show off our builds and to master the concepts, so that we can invite others into the lab for some collaboration work!

### KINDERGARTEN

This year, math is unanimously the favorite subject. The students thoroughly enjoy working with manipulatives during each lesson and stations are set up around the room for independent practice. This month, we will continue working with teddy bear counters to find ordinal counters to find ordinal positions, pattern blocks to cover designs, and linking cubes to create color patterns. We also use a program called DreamBox on the Chromebooks which focuses on individualized practice of certain math skills until they master that skill. Even though this program is new to our classroom, the kindergarten students are kindergarten students are catching on very quickly and meeting standards to move on to new skills!

### **GRADE1**

#### Mrs. Sara Fauser

This month, we will learn how to add two numbers together using a number sentence (4+4=8).We will explore different methods to add the numbers such as counting objects touchpoints, or counting on using a number line. I'm always excited to see which method they choose. Wrap-ups are also introduced! Wrap-ups are a fun way to practice our facts individually. First graders are practicing counting to 100 daily. We have different superheroes that help us count and exercise. Our favorite right now is Kylo Ren (Star Wars). We have also started to use DreamBox in first grade. Although, the boys are having a difficult time understanding that they are doing math and not just "playing on the Chromebooks"! Have a blessed October. Remember it is clergy appreciation month! Thank you Pastors, for all you do!

### **GRADE 2**

#### Mrs. Katie Rouse

The second grade class uses Saxon Math 2 to learn and demonstrate various Math skills. During the month of October, the students will focus on writing number sentences, creating graphs to show data or information, and create repeating patterns and display the patterns in different ways (by colors, shapes, letters). In addition to Saxon Math, we will continue to use a program on our Chromebooks called DreamBox. The students can further master a variety of math skills by using this unique, fun and interactive program.




