"There he came to a cave and lodged in it.
And behold, the word of the LORD came to him, and he said to him, 'What are you doing here, Elijah?' He said, 'I have been very jealous for the LORD, the God of hosts. For the people of Israel have forsaken your covenant, thrown down your altars, and killed your prophets with the sword, and I, even I only, am left, and they seek my life, to take it away.'" – 1 Kings 19:9-10

I have always been fascinated by this story from the life of the prophet Elijah. I am fascinated because I think it is a story that we can all relate to, at least in some way. First, a little bit of background is important. The passage above comes directly after Elijah's interaction with the 450 prophets of Baal. In the course of this interaction, both parties set up offerings to be burnt by their god, and it had been agreed upon that the god who sent fire down to consume the offering was the one, true God. You obviously know where this is going, even if you've never heard the story before. The prophets of Baal weep and lament, cutting themselves in servitude to the false god and still nothing happens. Afterward Elijah has his offering soaked in water and the Lord sent down an all-consuming fire to burn up not only his offering, but that of the prophets of the false god Baal. What a mighty and awesome deed! Elijah then slaughters the prophets of Baal at the Kishon brook. Talk about a great victory.

So why then do we see, in the above quoted portion of Scripture, Elijah's deep lamentation that he is left all alone? First, allow me to ask you a question that I hope you will take some time to think about. Has your life as a Christian always been an easy one? I think most, if not all, of us are able to say that it certainly is <u>not</u> easy to live in this world as a Christian. Though we see the Lord's great and mighty wonders every Lord's Day when we come to His house and receive the blessed absolution, when we are confronted with the trials and temptations that inevitably assault and assail us in our lives, how quick we are to lament about the fact that we have been left alone and all but abandoned to face them ourselves!

Elijah witnessed the great and powerful works of the hand of the God whom he served, yet when Jezebel threatens to take his life, he flees from her as though his God is like the false god Baal who was unable to help or save those who followed him. My friends, we do not serve a God who is deaf to our cries for mercy. We do not serve a God who is not active in our lives. We do not serve a God who does not understand our needs in this life. We do not serve a God who does not understand what it is to be tempted as we are.

Just as Elijah did, we serve a God who is mighty and powerful; the God who created and, moreover, sustains, all things. Ours is the God who not only created the world, but saved it by shedding His very own blood for the life of the world and all who live in it. Our God is none other than the Lord Jesus Christ, who was tempted as we are in every way, and yet was without sin in order that His sacrifice of body and blood would be a sufficient price to pay the debt that we own in our sin.

So my dear friends, as you read this newsletter this week, know that you are prayed for. Know that your prayers, whatever they may be, are heard by the God who has given you your "reason and all [your] senses, and still takes care of them", and He will never keep from you anything that is beneficial for you and your salvation. Though it may seem as if you are all alone in your plight, and though it may feel like the whole world stands against you, I pray that you will always take heart in the promises of your Lord to be with you and sustain you in all of your trials and temptations. If ever you need them, may you always remember the words of that great hymn "A Mighty Fortress". "Though devils all the world should fill, all eager to devour us, we tremble not, we fear no ill; they cannot overpower us. This world's prince may still scowl fierce as he will, he can harm us none. He's judged; the deed is done; one little word can fell him." That Word is Christ, He will, and indeed already has, won the victory over sin, death, and the devil for each and every one of you in the blessed sacrifice of His body and blood on the cross. May this be your eternal hope and comfort in your times of want, and may they be the words of praise on your lips each and every day! Amen.



Martin Luther suffered debilitating headaches. When told about a costly medicine that might offer some relief, Luther smiled and said, "My best prescription for head and heart is that 'God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him

should not perish, but have everlasting life." That Bible verse became a refrain for Luther on his deathbed. "What Spartan saying can be compared with this wonderful brevity," he said of John 3:16. "It is the Bible itself!" After repeating the words of that Gospel-in-a-nutshell verse three times in Latin, Luther exclaimed, "They are the best prescription for headaches and heartaches!"



- o A new checkbook policy for boards and committees was discussed and approved.


• Old business:

- Scrap paper




- 1. Lay the bag flat on a table, and place cardboard inside for protection.

- 4. Brush a thin layer of paint on the cut side of an apple half. Practice making stamps on scrap paper. Use the other color on the other apple half.
- 5. Paint and stamp the bag with your final design. When dry, remove the cardboard.






