Christmas is full of so many cultural traditions and myths. It is easy to be led to tangential and even irrelevant things as we try to focus on Christ at Christmas. What is important is to remember Christmas is what is written in Scripture and confessed in the creeds. Namely that Jesus, the babe of Bethlehem, is coeternal with the Father and with the Holy Spirit. He is eternally begotten before the creation of all worlds, not made, and Jesus Christ, our Lord, is both conceived by the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary.

Yet as the world looks at Christmas they seek other things. They seek the date of Christmas, the origin of Christmas traditions, and how it affects our celebrations today.

There is indeed a debate on the date of Christmas. In the west, the date was set as December 25 in the fourth century, while the Eastern Church continues to celebrate Christmas on January sixth, which we know as Epiphany, since long before Christmas' date was set in the west. We open our Bibles reading Matthew, Luke, and John and find nothing about the date of Jesus' birth. Yes, sheep were in the field at night, and yes, it was during the first Census while Quintus was governor of Syria, but the date us never given to us in Scripture. There is no scriptural day given for the birth of the Christ child.

Likewise, most Christmas traditions are not spoken of in the Bible. Our American Santa Clause seems to be a blending of several characters, St. Nicholas, whose saint day is Dec. 6, Father Christmas, a British Christmas gift giver resembling our American Santa Claus, and Chris Cringle, a more Nordic gift giver who always appeared to be bright and jolly with rosy cheeks. No doubt you have heard that our American Santa Claus comes to us from Atlanta and Coca Cola from their ads by Haddon Sundblom in the 1930s. You do see how none of this has anything to do with Scripture right? Sometimes, we do hear about how some of our Christian traditions were taken from pagan religions, but here again these are not things in scripture itself. And even if these myths seem similar to scriptural accounts, we know that there is the natural knowledge of God, which may account for a non-salvific shadows of the Gospel that might be seen in these pre-Christian celebrations.

As we go through the season of Advent and as we enter into Christmas, we will hear many worldly ideas and constructs about Christmas. This is nothing new. The remedy is still the same. There is no need to battle culture and attempt to force the world into belief, but rather, as St. Paul says, to be in the world but not of it. We can exchange gifts and decorate trees. We can even dawn out sanctuary in lights and decorations, for to us, the church, they are reminders of what we are celebrating this Christmas season and a reminder that the baby in the manger whom we await is none other than our savior who is Christ our Lord.

PONDERINGS AT THE END OF THE DAY

- OR YEAR: Dutch Catholic priest and theologian Henri Nouwen found it useful to reflect on several questions at the end of the day: "Did I offer peace today? Did I bring a smile to someone's face? Did I say words of healing?" Pondering such questions may prove valuable at the end of a year as well: "How did I contribute to peace in the world this past year? Did I bring smiles to others' faces? Did I offer words of healing?" Nouwen continued, and we can too: "Did I let go of my anger and resentment? Did I forgive? Did I love?" Many of us set New Year's resolutions for selfimprovement, asking, "What are my goals? How can I better myself, my weight, my work-life balance, my habits?" But Nouwen said of his self-inquiry: "These are the real questions. I must trust that the little bit of love that I sow now will bear many fruits, here in this world and [in] the life to come." His resolution was to share God's love with others. With God's help, it can be ours as well, for each new day and each new year.

GIFT (SCRIP) CARDS ORDERS: The next scrip order is due to the church office by 9 am, Dec. 4 (a week earlier than usual), and Jan. 8. Updated order blanks are on the table in the chapel hallway; please use these for your orders and throw away old order blanks. These orders will be available for pickup on Sunday, December 10, and January 14, in the church office after that, or make special arrangements with Jo Van Hoveln. 
SCRIP CARD EXPLANATION: The cards come in various amounts and can be used just like a credit/debit card at the designated vendor. For example, you order and get a \$100 Meijer card. The church gets \$3 (3%) of income from this card, and you buy \$100 worth of groceries, prescriptions, gas, etc. with it. There are varying rates on these cards from 1.5% to 13% so the amount the church receives depends on the rate on the individual vendor card. There is a printed list of the vendors and the percentages they give on the bulletin board and on their website at www.raiseright.com/resources/organization. These cards are good anywhere in the USA and make great birthday, Christmas, new baby, or wedding gifts.



The Measure of Our Generosity: If you open up the Small Catechism, you'll find a shortened version of the Third Commandment: "Remember the Sabbath day by keeping it holy." But if you look up the list of the Ten Commandments in Exodus, you'll find the full version: Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy. Six days you shall labor, and do all your work, but the seventh day is a Sabbath to the LORD your God. On it you shall not do any work, you, or your son, or your daughter, your male servant, or your female servant, or your livestock, or the sojourner who is within your gates. For in six days the LORD made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is in them, and rested on the seventh day. Therefore, the LORD blessed the Sabbath day and made it holy. (Ex. 20:8-11) Why did Luther shorten this commandment for the Small Catechism? Was it so that the kids wouldn't have so much to memorize? No, it was because Luther knew that all the details of the Third Commandment were part of the "shadow" of the Old Testament (Col. 2:16). Or as St. Paul puts it, there is "letter" in the Old Testament law and "spirit" (2 Cor. 3:6). The details of not working on Saturday were fulfilled by Christ. That part of the Sabbath regulation no longer applies. But the spirit of the law does remain: We need to dedicate sufficient time each week to hearing God's Word and giving it honor and respect. Or as Luther sums it up in the Small Catechism's explanation to the Third Commandment: "We should fear and love God so that we do not despise preaching and His Word but hold it sacred and gladly hear and learn it." The same sort of analysis applies to our giving. In the Old Testament, God commanded the Israelites to give a tenth of their income to the Levites so that those men could dedicate their lives to serving in God's house, teaching the people, conducting worship, etc. In the New Testament, there is a rigid requirement listed about handing in your tax forms to church to make sure you've given enough. But the mandate to have a full-time ministry, which is the spirit of that law concerning tithing to the Levites, is right there in 1 Corinthians 9:14: "The Lord has ordained that those who preach the Gospel should make their living from the Gospel." The New Testament church's job is significantly larger than the job of Old Testament Israel. We are commanded to preach the Gospel to all nations. There was only the temple to maintain in the Old Testament, but we have churches, schools, universities and seminaries, plus missionaries everywhere. So you tell me: Can we really undertake the work of the ministry if our giving doesn't even measure up to Old Testament levels of generosity?

YEAR END GIFTS: As we come to the end of another year we reflect on the blessings that God has given us. Even as the world seems to be lost and trying to redefine what is good and right, God's faithfulness to us still shine through. During this time, we give thanks for our bounty and prepare our hearts for the celebration of the gift of the Christ child. Many of us give extra gifts at this time of the year and it is also the time in which we have the largest giving month. For those of you who are considering making an extra gift, there is an opportunity for those of you over 70 1/2 years old. The Secure Act has a provision that allows gifts to charities from an IRA and the gift is not counted as income. This provision is called a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD). Some of you may have already utilized this provision but for those of you that have never heard of this here are some of the rules: 1) you must be at least 70 $\frac{1}{2}$. 2) you can give up to \$100,000 per year from an IRA or Qualified Plan. 3) while the income is reported it doesn't add to your taxable income and is not subject to the Individual Deduction or Itemized Deductions, in other words you do not need to exceed the Standard Deduction to claim the gift. If you need more information on how you can utilize the QCD for your gifting, contact your investment advisor or tax advisor. Thanks for all you do for our congregation and the mission of Christ here at Immanuel.

Blue Christmas

For many people, the approaching Christmas holiday does not bring with it the joy and happiness that is advertised on television or in greeting cards. They may be facing a holiday after the death of a loved one or after a divorce. Perhaps they have been unable to have a child, or have suffered through an emotional trauma. Or perhaps they feel pressured and overwhelmed by holiday preparations. In recognition that not everyone faces Christmas the same way, Immanuel will be hosting a Blue Christmas Service this year. It's not based on the Elvis Presley song, but rather is a quiet, contemplative service that usually happens on one of the longest evenings of December symbolic of our darker nights when we find ourselves grieving, lonely, or longing for something better. The Blue Christmas service is all about making space during a season that is noisy with celebration to acknowledge the "both/and" of our emotions. It's an avenue to offering care and compassion for those who are struggling. Our Blue Christmas will be held on Thursday, **Dec. 21**, at 6:30 pm in our Chapel. If you're struggling in celebrating Christmas this year, please join us.

CAPITAL FUND DRIVE: The current bank balance is \$38,565. Our current projects are the resealing of the north part of the parking lot for \$17,435, and new gutters and downspouts on the sanctuary for \$4,900. This leaves us with a little over \$16,000 for other projects. The congregation established the Capital Fund Drive in 2012, and thanks to our generous congregation, we have accomplished many needed upgrades/renovations. Prior generations worked and sacrificed to build the school/church building, and it is up to us to preserve and improve our church home just as we would our own household's.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS SUMMARY:

- **New Business:** A request to use the gym facilities for a birthday party was approved.

FIRST, CONTACT: In Unclean: Meditations on Purity, Hospitality and Mortality, Richard Beck writes powerfully about Jesus healing a leper in Matthew 8:1-3. "What is intriguing about this story is the sequence. Jesus touches the leper first. Then the command 'Be clean!' is offered. That is, Jesus' first move is into ritual defilement. By first touching the leper, Jesus ... [is] standing in solidarity with the unclean." Beck finds this "striking" because typically we expect purification before contact. But Jesus' actions reverse the pattern: "Contact occurs first." How fortunate for us, too, that God didn't wait to reach out to us until he had cleansed us of sin. God didn't save us from afar and only then come to live among us. Rather, "God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us" (Romans 5:8, ESV). And continuously, Jesus loves us, comes to us and touches our hearts, even when we are at our worst straying from God, trapped in sin, unworthy, unclean, unrighteous. For it's not our righteousness or purity that heals and saves us, but Christ's.



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
Christmas lights remind us that Jesus shines in the darkness. Here's a fun way to play with holiday lights.

What you do:


- 1. Plug in the lights and place them in the container.





