

THE PEACE OF CHRISTMAS

December 2025

When Jesus was born in the manger everything appeared so peaceful. After all, "The Cattle are lowing the baby awakes, but little Lord Jesus no Crying He makes". It was a silent night, and our hymnody marvels as the baby Jesus sleeps in heavenly peace. We view Christmas as a time of warm fuzzies, a time to put away the cold pricklies that we so often face here in this world. Our Christmas specials focus on the message of the Angels and point to good and uplifting things. Joseph is portrayed as a poor, but faithful and loving, husband and I am sure he was. Scripture tells us so when he has his dream and meets Gabriel (Luke 1:19-21). Even the conception of our Lord was a source of turmoil. Without the explicit word from God coming to Joseph through the angel Gabriel, Joseph would have followed his mind and left Mary(Matt 1:19), and this would have been within the law of God and Moses to do. Mary was a troubled single pregnant maiden, worried and confused. Shown in her one question to Gabriel, "How shall this be?"(Luke 1:34) she asks the angel. She received God's message and sang a beautiful song of majestic praise from her joyful heart(Lk 1:45-55), even as her mind danced in circles trying to fully understand the meaning of Gabriel's words. Mary ran to Elizabeth, herself pregnant with John, to find solace.

Then, on Christmas we see the tumult as Jesus is not born in a warm bedroom or in a normal sleeping quarters, but in a stable, Even if it was within the home as some now believe, it was not where you put the person of honor and it is not where to put a woman in labor. The dirty filthy manger is no place to lay an infant.

Then there were the shepherds the filthy grungy shepherd's just in from the fields who welcomed Jesus' birth. Not the nobles or the city council, not the military or other dignitaries in the city of David only the shepherds and the wisemen from the east who would come at Epiphany. The crisis and conflict of Christmas is all around in scripture if we read the text. Most of all there was King Herod the Great, a usurper of the throne of David, Who upon hearing of Jesus' birth did not rejoice but rather lashed out with the slaughter of the innocence. The first Christmas was anything but silent, it was anything but peaceful. The warfare of Christmas is there in the text in the narrative. From the beginning Satan was out to get Jesus and prevent Him from going to the cross and to defeat him on Calvary's holy mountain.

But the angel's sang songs of Peace. The angels declared peace, to Mary, to Joseph, to the Shepherds and to the world. What a contradiction we see. How are we to understand this dichotomy.



Christmas is the beginning of the demise of Satan, and the beginning of our salvation. That first Christmas, The King of Kings stepped down from His high and Kingly Hall. That first Christmas God of God became man. That first Christmas His heroic course began. This is why the angels sang and declared peace to all the world. The beginning of the end of Satan had come. It was like what eternal life is for us, a reality yet unseen. Here in the manger amongst the ox and the donkey, in with the sheep and the hen's lays the very one promised to the patriarchs of old. Here in the hay is the very fruit, the very offspring of Eve, who now will most certainly crush the serpent's head.

The peace of Christmas comes in the incarnation and birth of Jesus. His name, Immanuel, reminds us that God is with us, and knowing that God is with us, who can be against us. Nothing in this world can defeat us. Nothing in all of creation is greater than the very Word, Jesus, who created it. Jesus comes in peace. He comes in the manger, but like He will do when He is grown, Jesus comes in peace prepared for battle and riding a donkey as the kings of old did in peace. The battle, the war, is laid out. Jesus will overcome temptation and live a sinless and perfect life. Jesus will climb the Holy Mountain and vanguish Satan by His death on the Holy tree on that hill so far away. In dving on the cross Jesus will rain and unite us with Him once more. So, we rejoice that we have such a promise, and we cling to the cross of Christ where the victory, where the Peace has been won. Not for a time, but for an eternity. Christmas we rest in the arms of our loving God and rejoice in Christ our savior, We join in with the heavenly host and celebrate the peace which the Christ Child has won for us and the victory over sin, death, and the devil which is ours through Christ Jesus our Lord. These luminous decorations also help us prepare for the advent (or coming) of Jesus during Advent, a season of preparation. Today we will consider how lights point us to the coming of Christ and the glory He brings.



CRECHE – DECEMBER 17

We decorate in preparation for Christmas. Our decoration preparation includes the use of the crèche—the miniature model of the nativity scene. The crèche is a distinctively Christian decoration in that it depicts the characters involved in the nativity of Christ: Mary, Joseph, the shepherds, the Wise Men, the angels, the

stable animals, and—most important of all—the infant Jesus. As we view this manger scene, we recall the timeless story of God coming to earth as a baby to redeem us from our sins.

GIFTS – DECEMBER 24

We decorate for Christmas. Our decorations include wrapped presents — gifts in colorful boxes and bags that are placed under the Christmas tree. But these gifts all pale in comparison to the gift that started it all at Christmas—the gift of God's Son, whose birth brings us



regeneration, renewal, and eternal life. On Christmas Eve, we consider how the gifts under the tree point us to God's indescribable gift in Jesus Christ.

Allen is looking for a refrigerator to replace the broken one in the school kitchen. The exhaust fan in the kitchen has been repaired.




Turn old Christmas cards into beautiful keepsake ornaments! It's a fun, simple way to give new life to cards you've received and add a handmade touch to your tree.
