

But if we think back on the joy we felt during our Christmas celebrations, we keep the love of Christ in our hearts, and that gives us the strength to continue in our daily lives! SCRIP CARDS: The next Scrip order is due to the church office by 9 am on Monday, Jan. 9. This is an easy way to get something for everyone without the hassle of shopping in the stores, and these cards are good anywhere in the USA. Order forms are on the table in the chapel hallway. Orders are not limited to the vendors listed on the order blank. A complete list of the vendors can be found on their website: www.shopwithscrip.com or on the hall bulletin board. If your vendor is available write the name of the vendor, denomination of the gift card, number of cards wanted, and total amount on a blank line of the order form. McDonald's cards are now available with a 2% profit to the church! These orders will be available for pickup on Jan. 15 or in the church office after that.

What is Scrip? Scrip cards are gift cards and they come in various amounts. This fundraiser does not cost you anything! For example, you order and receive a \$100 Meijer card and pay \$100 for it. The church gets \$3 (3%) of income from this card, and you buy \$100 worth of groceries, prescriptions, gas, etc. with it. Retailers offer varying rates of profit 1.5% to 13% so the amount the church receives depends on the rate on the individual vendor card. There is a printed list of the vendors and the percentages they give on the bulletin board in the chapel hallway or on their website www.raiseright.com. These cards are good anywhere in the USA and can also be used for confirmation, birthday, graduation, Christmas, new baby, or wedding gifts.

SUNDAY SCHOOL: What a joy to see the Sunday School children lead us in telling the Christmas story in December! Thank you to parents for your help and support. Sunday School meets each Sunday at 8:30 am. We look forward to seeing you.

FIRST COMMUNION: We all love to see a little baby baptized. Indeed, this is a joyous occasion. For in baptism we are brought to the cross of Calvary, and all our sins are washed away in the blood of the lamb who is of Christ Jesus our Lord.

As we celebrate the joy of baptism we might miss a few of the promises that are made. As the baby or young child is presented by the parents, they pledge to see that their child is brought up in the church, taught the scriptures, taught the faith, and prepared to receive the Lord's Supper. Oh, that all these oaths and promises would be kept! We would have many more children in our pews each week.

This month, on **Jan. 15**, our confirmands will, having been instructed on the Lord's Supper, its elements, its blessing, and its reception will for the first time eat at the Table of the Lord and partake of His Supper, feasting on the body and blood of our Lord and savior Jesus Christ.

This is not the end of their instruction. Confirmation will be later this spring. This is the next step in their faith and we will be celebrating with them.

So what is the Lord's Supper? What do we receive in it? And what is required for its reception? In communion, in the Lord's Supper, we receive exactly what Jesus promises us when He institutes this sacrament on Maundy Thursday at the end of the Passover meal. We receive the very body and blood of our savior. Not in a symbolic way but in a true, real, and physical way as the bread and wine become His very Body and Blood, just as he turned the water into wine at the Wedding of Canna. Yet the bread and the wine still remain to nurture our physical body. Through the Supper we receive the faith, forgiveness, and eternal life won for us by Jesus Christ Himself by his death and passion upon Calvary's cross.

That sounds wonderful, doesn't it? Why not give it to everyone? Judas gives us the answer. Judas received the Sacrament unworthily, that is without faith. He ate and drank to his own damnation, leaving the supper early, sneaking out to meet with those who would arrest Jesus. Giving Jesus a kiss not of love, but of betrayal when he is reunited with Christ in the garden, and then taking his own

life in a gruesome way, fulfilling the words of Jesus that it would have been better for him not to have been born. Obviously, we do not wish this upon anyone, so we teach and instruct people before we welcome them to the Lord's Supper. Then rightly taught and rightly confessing

not damnation, but the gifts of Faith forgiveness and eternal life are given through the reception of the Sacrament of the Altar.

TASTY CREATIONS

Make this yummy treat to remember what happened on each day of Creation.

What you need:

- 6 large pretzel rods
- Candy melts (white, chocolate and blue)
- Green sprinkles
- White or star-shaped sprinkles
- Fish crackers
- Animal crackers
- Adult help



What you do:

- 1. With help, melt the three colors of candy melts in separate dishes. Microwave for 30 seconds at a time, stirring until soft.
- 2. Decorate one pretzel for each day of Creation:
 - Dip half in white and half in chocolate to show light and darkness.
 - Dip half in white and half in blue to show separation of the atmosphere.




