Where do different Bible translations come from?

When Alexander the Great went on his conquest, he left the influence of Greek culture and language throughout most of the known world of his time. One of the great contributions stemming from this was the Septuagint. The Septuagint is a Greek translation of the Old Testament surrounded by history and legend. The Septuagint was assembled by the order of King Ptolemy and his under magistrate, Demetrius of Phaleron, to collect writings from all the world. As part of this, Eleazar, the high priest in Jerusalem, was ordered to translate the Jewish Scripture into Greek. According to the legend, seventy-two scribes were assigned the task and each of their individual translations were identical. Looking at the number of English translations today, or even the number of translations in my Greek classes in seminary, and seeing all the variations, this most certainly either a myth or truly a divine miracle of God.

For the New Testament, St. Jerome translated the Greek New Testament and the Septuagint into what is known as the Latin Vulgate, circa 383 AD. This was less of a translation and more of a compilation and harmonization of the various Latin texts and translations of Scripture already in existence. The Latin Vulgate became the standard version of the Bible used by the western church during the middle ages.

St. Jerome assembled the Vulgate at the request of Pope Damasus and combined the various Latin text that were available into a single official translation we know as the (Latin) Vulgate today.

In the Middle Ages, some did translate the Bible into the language Franca, or common tongue of their region. Most notable of these was John Wycliffe, who in 1384 was the first to translate the Bible into English.

As part of his service to the church, and during his exile in Wartburg Castle, Martin Luther translated the Bible into German. For this he used both the Latin Vulgate of St. Jerome and the various Greek text that were available to him as well.


Today, the work continues with groups like Lutheran Bible Translators and Faith Comes by Hearing that bring both the written and read Word to people in many different languages to people all over the world.

ALL SAINTS' DAY: In the western church, All Saints' Day is celebrated on Nov. 1. This is why it was on All Hollow's Eve, or Halloween, that Martin Luther posted his ninety-five theses. He knew that many people would be coming to celebrate this high feast of the church year.

"Saints" are all true believers on earth and in heaven, both living and dead. However, in the Lutheran Confessions, the departed ones do not hold a higher "position" in the Church. We do not pray to the departed Saints, as God commanded we are only to worship and pray to the one true God, the Triune God. Some are revered for the role they served in Christ's Church, but just as all true believers today, each is just another sinner washed in the blood of Christ.

On the modern church calendar, All Saints' Day is the last day of the church year. It is a day set aside to remember not just the martyrs of the church, but all those who, having finished their course in faith, now rest with the Lord. This is a reality we recognize each time we celebrate communion and are joined by the courts of heaven and the invisible church. This is why our altar rail is in somewhat of a half circle. We, the visible church, come to the one side, and invisibly the rail continues around the invisible church completing the circle.

Who is in the invisible church? The invisible church is composed of exactly who we mention in the proper preface (Hebrews 12:1). Along with the great heavenly hosts, there are also those who have come out of the great tribulation. All those who have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the lamb (Rev. 12:11). A full united circle is made as the visible and invisible church come together to worship the Lord and to receive His gifts.

All Saints' Day is a time to remember this divine truth as we remember those who have won the crown (Heb. 4:7). In our service, we take time to remember each member who has died this past year. Each member who has entered into glory and are now in the presence of our Savior, seeing Him face to face, a member of the Church Triumphant. *We hope you will join us for this special service on Sunday, Nov.* 6. In our celebration, we'll remember those who have died in Christ with the hope of salvation and redemption by His grace. We also remember the Christian faithful from all generations. All Saints' Day is a day to glorify Jesus Christ, who by His holy life and death redeemed the lost and made them saints through Holy Baptism and faith in Him.

GIFT (SCRIP) CARDS: Start your Christmas *shopping early!* November orders are due to the church office by 9 am on Monday, Nov. 14. Orders are not limited to the vendors listed on the order blank; if you want to order a vendor not listed, you can check the vendor list on the bulletin board or look it un online at www.raiseright.com. (please note: the website name has changed.) At the very bottom of the home page is a heading "Brand List," Click on it and click on "view all". On the lower left side of this page has "Retailers List." If the vendor you are looking for is available, write the name of the vendor, denomination of the gift card, number of cards wanted, and total amount on a blank line of the order form. Your orders will be available for pickup on Nov. 20, or in the church office after that. Select cards are available all the time; they are most of the local fast food/chain restaurants (with varying rates of profit to the church), plus Meijer (3% profit of face value of the card to church) and Wal-Mart (2.5% profit of face value of the card to church. If you would like gifts cards that are available without ordering, see Jo Van Hoveln, Judy Creek or Kim Davis.

What is Scrip? How does it work? The cards come in various amounts and can be used just like a gift card at the designated vendor. For example, you order a \$100 Meijer card and pay \$100 for it. The church gets \$3 (3%) of income from this card, and you buy \$100 worth of groceries, prescriptions, gas, etc. with it. There are varying rates on these cards from 1.5% to 13% so the amount the church receives depends on the rate on the individual vendor card. There is a printed list of the vendors and the percentages they give on the bulletin board in the chapel hallway or at www.raiseright.com. These cards are good anywhere in the USA and can also be used for confirmation, birthday, graduation, Christmas, new baby, or wedding gifts.
