Sola Scripture, Sola Fide, Sola Gratia, Sola Christus. The four solas. The foundation of the Reformation. I have learned of another sola being inserted, Sola Crux. That is, by the cross alone. This fits in well, but historically it was not spoken of, but reasonably was encompassed under Sola Christus, for the entire work of Christ was His cross. In Lk 9 Jesus first turns his face towards Jerusalem, but even earlier St Matthew shows Jesus declaring his divinity at the very beginning of His ministry in Nazareth as He reads the scroll of Isaiah in Matthew 2, Jesus already clearly and plainly proclaims Himself to be the Christ, the promised one, the long awaited Messiah as Jesus is handed the scroll of Isaiah and declares these things to be fulfilled in their midst, that is proclaims Himself to be the Son of God. Scripture tells of the cross. Yet, our right, clear, and bold proclamation of the cross of Christ begs the question, which side of the reformation do we as Lutherans fall on? We Lutherans are not Catholic. Our confessions clearly establish this fact. As the LCMS, we do not even have bishops, that office of the church being relegated to the Distract President who, strictly speaking, holds only an advisory role over member congregations and ministers. Indeed, our ecclesiastical structure can best be described as congregational. The S in LCMS stands for Synod that is a walking together in unison. With all this in mind, clearly we are not Catholic, and I have not even mentioned Martin Luther's 1537 "Treatise on the Power and Supremacy of the Pope".

Yet, we certainly do not fit well into Protestantism either. We believe in the power of the sacraments and believe them to be exactly what Jesus said they were and to bring us the very blessings promised to us through them. All this by the grace of God. We have crucifixes in our sanctuaries, and our theology is so far removed from John Calvin's TULIP theology that we might only be described as TUI.

All this leaves Lutherans fighting off theology from both sides, and can lead to the impression that we do not get along with anyone. We cannot take mass from the hand of a Catholic priest, neither can we receive communion from the protestant church next door. For neither agrees with Scripture in their understanding of the sacraments.

As Lutherans we stand alone with the Word of God. Holding Scripture above both human wisdom and tradition. As traditional as we are, we do not do things simply because they have always been done. We do the theological things we do because they are right and proper, that is God pleasing, to do them. Yes, we treasure our traditions, and we get upset when they are changed, but we do not hold the date of our bazaar on the same plane as Holy Scripture. Yes, we love our hymnal, but we get used to the new one, eventually, and we realize that as much as we miss the TLH, the two hymnals that have come after it (LW and LSB) are full of the same theology and can be used.

True also, we do not elevate our own minds above scripture. We do not look at the miracles of Jesus and limit them to logical common place events. When Genesis says God created the world in six days and when Genesis also says the whole earth was flooded, we believe it. When The Gospels say Jesus was born of a virgin, we believe it, and when we hear that Jesus died and was buried before rising gain on the third day we believe it to be true. For these are written and given to us in the Holy Scripture. These things are recorded for us in the Bible, and we know that The Bible is the very word of God. Our human intellect is a beautiful thing, but we know that our thoughts are not God's thoughts, and that our ways are not God's ways. This is why we pray "Thy will be done" and why we ask not for our kingdom, but the kingdom of God to come and be amongst us.

As we celebrate the reformation let us thank and praise our maker for the gifts of faith, forgiveness ad eternal life He gives to us because of what Jesus Christ our Lord has accomplished for us upon Calvary. Happy Reformation day.

It's in the Way that You Use It - Consider the humble baseball bat. It is a simple tool designed for a complex task. The batter needs a tool that can consistently deliver force to a small ball which may be thrown at over 100 miles per hour, but which might also come slanting across the plate as a slow curve. For a game like this, the founders of baseball had to redesign the old cricket bat, which is more of a flat paddle. The tool had to fit the job. But even a specially designed tool can be used for a different purpose. It turns out that some years ago in England, the home of cricket, baseball bats suddenly started selling like hotcakes. What were folks across the pond doing with all those baseball bats? Using them as clubs in riots! A tool can be used, and it can be misused. It's all in the way that you use it. The same is true with the things of God. The Second Commandment states that we should "not misuse the name of the Lord." In the Small Catechism, Luther goes on to tell us exactly what this misuse is, as well as the proper use: "We should fear and love God so that we do not curse, swear, use satanic arts, lie, or deceive by His name, but call upon it in every trouble, pray, praise, and give thanks." The Lord has given us His name: He has placed it upon us in Holy Baptism and He has invited us to pray to Him as our Father. In this sense, the Lord's name is something for us to use. We should not misuse it ... and we should not fail to use it. The Pharisees of old were so afraid of misusing the name of God that they decided to simply never say the name of God (YHWH, Je-hovah) at all! This non-use is just as bad as misuse. The Lord gives His gifts for our use. A Christian steward is one who is called to use all of God's gifts for His purposes. This includes things like the Name of God, the Sacraments and the Word, and it also includes things like our family and friends, our talents and skills, our money and resources. Everything that God has given to you, He has entrusted to you so that you may be blessed to use it for His kingdom. It's all in the way that vou use it!

The results of the fundraiser will be posted in future Immanuel Lights and monthly newsletters. SCRIP ORDERS: The next Scrip order is due to the church office by 9 am on Monday, Oct. 9. Updated order blanks are on the table in the chapel hallway; please use these for your orders and throw away your old blanks. Orders are not limited to the vendors listed on the order blank; if you want to check if your favorite vendor participates in the Scrip program, you can find a full vendor list and check the availability online at raiseright.com/resources/organization or see the list posted in the hallway bulletin board. If your vendor is available write the name of the vendor, denomination of the gift card, number of cards wanted, and total amount on a blank line of the order form. The following have been added to the vendor list: McDonald's (2% profit), Casey's Gas (3% profit), Saltgrass Steakhouse (9% profit), Jimmy John's Subs (8% profit), and Sonic (when it opens) with an 8% profit to the church. These orders will be available for pickup on Sunday, Oct. 15, or in the church office after that, or you may make special arrangements with Jo Van Hoveln. Selected cards are available all the time; they are most of the local fast food/chain restaurants (with varying rates of profit to the church), plus Meijer and Wal-Mart. If you have questions, please see Jo Van Hoveln, Judy Creek, or Kim Davis.

SCRIP CARD EXPLANATION: The cards come in various amounts and can be used just like a credit/debit card at the designated vendor. For example, you order and get a \$100 Meijer card. The church gets \$3 (3%) of income from this card, and you buy \$100 worth of groceries, prescriptions, gas, etc. with it. There are varying rates on these cards from 1.5% to 13% so the amount the church receives depends on the rate on the individual vendor card. There is a printed list of the vendors and the percentages they give on the bulletin board and at www.raiseright.com/resources/organization. These cards are good anywhere in the USA and can also be used for confirmation, birthday, graduation, Christmas, new baby, or wedding gifts.

CAPITAL FUND DRIVE: The current bank balance is \$35,002.00 (This does not include our proceeds from the Steak Fry.) Our current project is the resealing of the north part of the parking lot and a couple of other areas for \$17,435. The north parking lot area will also have stripes for parking. There are special envelopes at the ushers' desk and between the Stewardship bulletin board by the coat room and member mailboxes. The Capital Fund was established in 2012, and thanks to you, our generous congregation, we have accomplished many much needed upgrades and renovations. Prior generations worked and sacrificed to build the school/church building, and it is up to us to preserve and improve our church home just as we would our own household's. There is a list of projects completed and the costs on the Capital Fund bulletin board (between the mailboxes and the coat room); please stop by and check it out. There are special envelopes at the same bulletin board for ongoing donations throughout the year. WOMEN'S GUILD NEWS:

- The Women's Guild luncheon meeting for October will be on Oct. 10 at 11:30 am. Bring a dish to share; tableware, dessert, and drinks provided. Please join us as we discuss upcoming activities.
- Our **ingathering** project for September and October is for the Women's Care Clinic. Located on North Bowman Avenue, the Women's Care Clinic provides help and hope to women and men facing unplanned or difficult pregnancies. Most needed items currently are baby wipes, diapers (up to size 2), bottles, baby clothing, laundry soap for baby clothes, formula (any kind), and bibs. There is a labeled tote in the coat room for your donations.
- Why are we collecting all those medicine bottles? We send pill bottles to Matthew 25: Ministries in Ohio. These donations serve two purposes: 1. Helping the poorest of the poor by providing a way to distribute medicine in capped containers, and 2. Keeps thousands of bottles out of landfills. Many of the plastic bottles are recycled for cash to fund Matthew 25: Ministries' programs. The cost to send these bottles to Ohio is approximately \$25/month. There is a signup sheet on the bulletin board for those wishing to sponsor a month's postage.
- The Women's Guild sends monthly support to both an **LCMS missionary** and a seminary student. On **Oct. 15**, our missionary to Puerto Rico, Ashley Lehr, will be visiting Immanuel and sharing her ministry to Puerto Rico with us. Please join us after church (approx. 10:45) in the gym for a potluck and Ashley's presentation about her ministry. If possible, please bring a dish to share. Tableware, meat, and drinks will be provided. There will also be a door offering after church for Ashley's ministry. We hope you'll join us!

BOARD OF DIRECTORS SUMMARY:

- New Business: The date was set for the October Voters' Meeting – Oct. 8. The agenda will include annual reports from all boards. Hustle Hoops will start up again mid-November and run through the end of January. October is Church Worker Appreciation Month. The board approved financing continuing education for Rachel. It is a requirement for DCFS in return for a 2-year commitment.

- **Properties:** Security numbers have been placed on every entrance. Plans with the numbered entrances will be sent to the Danville Police Department. Many plumbing issues have come up. We are in the process of replacing upgraded cameras where needed. The dumpster was switched from a 4 to a 6 yard. The Men's Club paid for the new refrigerator. The Women's Guild paid for the dishwasher repair. The next Capital Fund project after resealing the parking lot may be to replace church guttering.
- **Stewardship:** The date for the Fall Rummage and Bake Sale was moved up to Sept. 22 & 23.
- Worship: No report.
- **Parish Education:** A motion was passed to update the signers on the Parish Ed account.
- Youth: Youth enjoyed an afternoon at Kickapoo playing games and cooking out. The renovation of the Youth Room is in full swing and ongoing. Future events planned include a bonfire and pumpkin painting, and a camping trip to Camp CILCA. A motion was passed to update the signers for the youth checking account.
- Missions: Reviewed Reports.
- Elders: Brooklyn and Benjamin Hunt will start Confirmation class.
- **Deaconess Intern:** Rachel gave a brief report on her activities with the school and the youth. She also gave a presentation on her Community Outreach project.
- Vice President: No report.
- **President:** Josh reported that he is working on getting a meeting scheduled with the Cemetery Committee. We received a request from the library for a map of the cemetery.


