

This October 31 marks the 508th anniversary of Martin Luther nailing his Ninety-Five Theses to the door of the church in Wittenberg, Germany, where he served as both a priest and a professor. That was then. This is now. How does the Reformation still impact us today?

We've studied the history. We've explored the theology. But how does the Reformation—sparked by Luther over half a millennium ago—continue to shape our lives? The answer lies in the *Solas*.

Sola Gratia (by grace alone), Sola Fide (by faith alone), Solus Christus (through Christ alone), Sola Scriptura (Scripture alone).

These were the battle cries of the Reformation, and much of the Christian Church still claims them. But how do they apply today?

Among them, perhaps the most crucial is *Sola Scriptura*—Scripture alone. The other Solas flow from it, for it is through Scripture that we know grace, faith, and Christ. Our past newsletters have previously discussed these themes, but the question remains: *How do they live on in our modern world?*

Let's explore Sola Scriptura by applying it directly to a current issue in our own community.

Recently, a new business opened in Danville: Affirmative Care Solutions, an abortion clinic that also provides what it calls "gender-affirming care." A quick glance at their website (though many may choose not to visit) reveals a focus on these two services. Rather than respond with raw emotion, we remember Pilate's question to Jesus: "What is truth?" (John 18:38).

Truth is not found in our feelings or preferences—truth is found in Scripture. This is the essence of Sola Scriptura.

So, what does the Bible say about the two main services this clinic offers?

On Gender and Identity

Genesis 1:27 tells us, "So God created man in his own image, in the image of God he created him; male and female he created them."

This passage affirms two key truths. Every human being is created in the image of God and God created humanity in two distinct sexes, male and female.

The idea that gender is a personal choice or fluid concept is not found in Scripture. This idea is defeated. Rather, it is God who defines our identity, including our biological sex. We recognize that some individuals suffer deeply from what the DSM-5 defines as Gender Dysphoria. As Christians, we are called to respond not with hate, but with compassion, love, and, most importantly, truth.

On Abortion and the Sanctity of Life

Scripture also speaks clearly on the value of life. There is even a whole commandment about life's physical support. Exodus 20:13 commands, "You shall not kill."

Once again, we look to the Bible. The Bible is how do we know that a fetus is indeed a human life. Jeremiah 1:5 proclaims, "Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, before you were born I set you apart; I appointed you as a prophet to the nations."

Psalm 139:13 echoes, "For you formed my inward parts; you knitted me together in my mother's womb."

These verses leave no doubt life begins at conception in our mother's womb and that every unborn child is known and valued by God. Therefore, we proclaim this truth boldly, not in judgment but in love.

An article of this length cannot fully address these complex and emotional topics, but we are not without resources. If you would like to learn more or engage in further discussion, please reach out to me. I am available and welcome thoughtful, Scripture-based dialogue on these matters.

Applying Scripture to modern issues helps us respond faithfully to the challenges of our time. The opening of Affirmative Care Solutions in Danville brings these challenges close to home. The Bible does not speak with hatred, but it does speak with clarity, and so must we.

We proclaim God's Word, standing on the Reformation truth of *Sola Scriptura*, not to condemn, but to speak the truth in love to our neighbors and our community. Let us continue to be rooted in Scripture, shaped by grace, and committed to truth.

It's saying, "Lord, here's my plan—but I trust Yours more." It means slowing down, paying attention, and being willing to let God rearrange our day for His greater purpose. Proverbs 16:9 (NIV) reminds us, "In their hearts humans plan their course, but the Lord establishes their steps." May we have the courage to let Him.

SCRIP ORDERS: There will not be a Scrip Card order in October. Are you looking for a thoughtful gift, or just want to make your everyday purchases work for a good cause? Scrip cards are great for birthdays, graduations, confirmations, weddings, holidays (It's not too early to begin thinking about Christmas gifts!), even your weekly grocery run. The next Scrip order is due to the church office by 9 am on Nov. 10 and will be ready for pick up on Nov. 16. Here's how it works: you purchase a gift card at face value (for example, a \$100 Meijer card), and the church receives a percentage back (in this case, 3%). You still get the full \$100 to spend—on groceries, gas, prescriptions, or whatever you normally buy—and the church gets a boost at no extra cost to you. Every card you purchase helps support the daily expenses of our church home. Thank you for using this simple and impactful way to give back!

CAPITAL FUND: The current balance is \$152,329. We also have a grant \$ of \$50,000 that will be given to us when our current project has been completed. Also, we have received grants from the Iroquois Federal Foundation and from the Vermilion Healthcare Foundation. 79% of OUR GOAL of \$260,000 for our current project of reroofing the school/gym wing of the building is currently funded! Stop by the display in the narthex to see the pictures of the current roof. The congregation established the Capital Fund Drive in 2012, and thanks to our generous congregation, we have accomplished many needed upgrades/renovations. Prior generations worked and sacrificed to build the school/church building, and it is up to us to preserve and improve our church home just as we would our own household's. There is a Capital Fund Drive bulletin board in the hallway between the coat room and the parish mailboxes, where you'll find envelopes for ongoing donations throughout the year. They will also be replacing all the skylights which are original to the building (1950's). They plan on starting as soon as possible this fall. A new project will be decided upon early next year.

A Message from Rev. Jeff Harter

In Autumn, we naturally think of change. Leaves change colors and fall to the ground. Our wardrobe changes as warm summer breezes give way to brisk autumn winds. Clocks change back to "regular time." The days grow shorter and the nights longer. As we deal with these and other changes, we can thank God that we are not buzzards, bats, or bumble bees! If a buzzard is placed in a 6x8-foot pen with no top, it is trapped because it must begin its flight with a 10-12foot run. A bat placed on the ground will lie helplessly because it must take off from an elevated position. A bumblebee will remain trapped in an open jar because it can't look up, only down and sideways. The buzzard, bumblebee, and bat may become stuck in a difficult or unfamiliar situation. God gave us the ability to adapt to change. He changes our hearts when we repent, deny ourselves, and trust in him for forgiveness and salvation. We can look up to God in prayer and search His Word for guidance. He lifts us up when we are down. And when we feel trapped, he enables us to soar above our circumstances. We can embrace change with confidence that he will carry us through any situation. 

Sermon Text: John 8:31-32




Create a simple and meaningful prayer box your family can use to share requests and pray together all week long.
