We have this $\mathbb{H} \mathbb{O} \mathbb{D} \mathbb{E}$ as an anchor for the soul, $\mathbb{F} \mathbb{I} \mathbb{R} \mathbb{M} \ \& \ \mathbb{S} \mathbb{E} \mathbb{C} \mathbb{U} \mathbb{R} \mathbb{E}$,

Hebrews 6:19, NIV

Doctrine and tradition, they are similar, and both are worthy of our attention. Doctrine and tradition they are not the same. Doctrine is rooted in scripture and taught by the word of God. Think of the Lord's supper and the words of Christ, Himself, commanding us to "Do this in remembrance of Me". The Lord's Supper and Its celebration and use is doctrine.

Tradition may have its roots in scripture, but it need not be so. Again, think of the Lord's Supper. Celebrating it and using the proper elements, grape wine and unleavened bread, what we teach and confess about it is doctrine. But many things around the Lord's Supper are tradition. Common or individual cups, large pieces of cracker-like bread or individual wafers, standing or kneeling, these all might be important, but they fall under tradition.

Look at our service and there, too, you will see a mix of tradition and doctrine. Article XV of the Augsburg Confession states that traditions that enhance our faith should be retained, but that any which lead us to lean on our own works or actions for God's favor should be abandoned and disowned.

We are free to sit, stand, or kneel for the reception of communion. We are free to gather around at the rail or to walk through in an orderly line. We are not free to change the words of Christ. We are not free to change the elements used. Soda and chips would not be acceptable and neither is grape juice.

Likewise in baptism we are free to sprinkle, pour, or fully immerse the one being baptized. Where there is water and the word there is baptism. The Small Catechism teaches us this. We are free to baptize at our font, or even in Lake Vermilion. We are free to use running, living water, or still and stagnant water, but we are not free to have a baptism without water of any sort. We are free to have an elaborate ceremony or a simple washing, but we are not free to exclude the word of God and the use of His name.

How do we know the difference between tradition and doctrine? Looking at scripture does help. We see Jesus being brought to be circumcised. This is in accord with God's Word (Genesis 17:10-12). That he was brought to the temple for his circumcision was more a matter of tradition. Later in life, we see Jesus paying the temple tax (Matthew 17:24-27) to enter the temple, His own house, and does so with the miraculous catch or a fish with a gold coin in its mouth. He teaches us both about tradition, the tax, and the authority of the leaders who collect it. Jesus also breaks traditions. He speaks and associates with Gentiles. He heals on the Sabbath. Imagine if we only spoke to other LCMS Lutherans or if our hospitals were closed on Sundays. That would not be right.

In our service we have traditions too. The liturgy is truly good, but one cannot say ONLY the LSB. We cannot say that variations are not allowed. It is good to use the LSB so that we all are on the same page, so that our members are not lost when they visit sister congregations.

Within our service we have our own traditions, and they are good. We bring the elements forward with the offering, we stand and sit at the appointed times, we have a hymn after the sermon on non-communion Sundays, and we love sharing the peace with one another. Here, I won't even mention our Steak Fry Dinner, Women's Guild Bazaar, or German Dinner.

All these are good things, but nowhere in the Bible are we mandated to do them or instructed on how we are to do them. These events are rooted in the traditions we share and passed down to one another and have a purpose. Our various dinners support our congregation and our mission. They also provide a time for fellowship and even a little outreach. When I was in Alabama, I always washed my hands with water and a towel during the service of the sacrament. It always felt odd until I learned it was done in memory of Pilate washing his Hands at Jesus's trial. Then I loved it.

In all things, whether doctrine or tradition, God's Word remains our anchor. As traditions shift and adapt over time, it is the unchanging truth of Scripture that grounds us. Hebrews 6:19 says, "We have this hope as an anchor for the soul, firm and secure." That hope is Christ, revealed through the Word. While traditions may enrich our worship and fellowship, it is the sure and steady Word of God that holds us fast in faith, guiding us through every generation with unwavering truth.

CAPITAL FUND: The current fund balance is \$206,233. We have been awarded (but will not receive it until the end of the project) a grant of \$50,000 for this project from the Julius W. Hegeler II Foundation, which is reflected in the current fund balance. Also, we have received grants from the Iroquois Federal Foundation and from the Vermilion Healthcare Foundation. 79% of OUR GOAL of \$260,000 for our current project of reroofing the school/gym wing of the building is currently funded! Stop by the display in the narthex to see the pictures of the current roof. We want to schedule the project for the spring of 2026 at the latest, so we need to raise the rest of the money (approximately \$53,767) this year. The congregation established the Capital Fund Drive in 2012, and thanks to our generous congregation, we have accomplished many needed upgrades/renovations. Prior generations worked and sacrificed to build the school/church building, and it is up to us to preserve and improve our church home just as we would our own household's. There is a Capital Fund Drive bulletin board in the hallway between the coat room and the parish mailboxes, where you'll find envelopes for ongoing donations throughout the year. If you have any questions, please contact Jo Van Hoveln or any of the committee members. THANK YOU to everyone who has helped to raise this money for the project. Pray for the Capital Fund and the completion of the current project.




Men's Shooting Retreat - Sat., Sept. 20


Create adorable sheep using graham crackers, marshmallows, and a little imagination!


What you need:
